Cable Despatches.

LONDON, January 17.—A terrible hurricane occurred in Teneriffe. Ships were driven to sea and houses unroofed. The damage is great.

News Items.

CHARLESTON, January 17.—Arrived schooner N. W. Smith, New York. Sailed ship Richard III, Liverpool; schooner S. J. Waring, Boston.

WASHINGTON, January 17.—Customs receipts for the week ending January 11, \$3,388,000.

The regular Cabinet meeting was held to-day. Stanton did not appear.

The Military Committee, in view of the unsettled state of the South, have decided to defer action for reducing the army.

Persons who have conversed with Grant, say he is very guarded in his language regarding the pending reconstruction bill.

Col. W. D. Mann, Assessor of Internal Revenue, for Mobile, is here urging changes in cotton regulations, whereby his claimed annoyances connected with United States tags may be lessened, and possibly lead to the abolishment of tags altogether.

The Committee of Ways and Means adopted the following: That it is the sense of this Committee, that \$150,000,000 of revenue shall be considered as the whole amount of revenue to be obtained from internal tax, and that the same, as far as practicable, be collected from 1—distilled spirits and fermented liquors. 2—tobacco and manufactures of tobacco. 3—stamps. 4—special taxes. 5—incomes. 6—dividends. 7—luxuries and amusements. 8—banks and railroads. 9—legacies and successions; leaving the least possible sum to be collected from industrial pursuits, or relieving that class of interest entirely.

ATLANTA, January 17.—The commission appointed by Gen. Meade to examine into the alleged mal-administration on the part of the City Council, adjourned over until Tuesday next, in order to give time for a full investigation. After the adjournment of the commission, a meeting of citizens was held in the Council Chamber, and committees were appointed to obtain evidence sustaining the charges set forth in the petition against the Mayor and Council.

General Orders No. 12, dated Atlanta, January 17, removes John T. Burns, Comptroller of Georgia, for declining to respect the instructions of, and failing to co-operate with, the Major-General Commanding. Capt. Charles Wheaton, of the 33d Infantry, is ordered to Milledgeville as Comptroller.

BUFFALO, N. Y., January 17.—A negro has commenced a suit against the managers of the Opera, for ejecting himself and wife from seats. New York, January 17.—A Southerner, named Debelleaux, bank clerk, fractured A. J. Pemberton's skull, in a duel to-day. Pemberton offended Debelleaux's sister.

Congressional.

WASHINGTON, January 17.—Last night's session was devoted to the discussion of the new cotton bill, with several angry colloquys.

The Senate was not in session to-day.

In the House, the Ways and Means Committee reported on the anti-contract bill, with the recommendation of the Senate amendments; which was adopted. Several private bills were disposed of. The vote on reconstruction was postponed to Monday. The session to-morrow will be for debate only. The discussion was resumed. Brooks made a strong speech in opposition. Alluding to the radical programme, he said: "We don't intend to be ruled by any such Government as that, and the processes of legislation by which it is to be reached will be undone by the people. Many of the opposition members are acting in utter defiance of the expressed will of their constituents." Referring to the Supreme Court, Brooks said: "You may overthrow Andrew Johnson; you may destroy the Executive; you may turn whole States into Haytis, Jamaica and Africa; but when you throw yourselves against that bulwark of the Constitution, your puny arms will shake and quiver and be blasted in the first blow you strike against it." Hubbard, of Connecticut, followed in denunciation of the bill and the emanation of the Supreme Court. He denounced the proposed legislation as felony against the States; he would not say Congress was infamous, but this bill was more than infamous. He gave notice that should Grant accept the law and carry it out as proposed, he would break his back before the people; he would forfeit all the honors he had won. This bill and all others were got up for Africanizing the States—thus Republicanizing them and making use of them to neutralize majorities at the North. The debate proceeded, and the Republicans were evidently on

defensive throughout. The Committee on Freedmen reported a bill for the sale of certain lands and lots on the sea islands of Beaufort District, S. C. Petitions from citizens of Louisiana, asking aid in the construction of the Opelousas Railroad, were offered. Adjourned.

The Reconstruction Conventions.

CHARLESTON, January 17.—In the Convention, to-day, Parker introduced an ordinance to establish a homestead law, exempting property to the amount of \$2,500 from levy or seizure; which was referred to the Judiciary Committee. Hurley proposed an ordinance to declare all outstanding obligations for the purchase of slaves null and void; which was referred to the Judiciary Committee. Langley introduced a resolution, declaring that the public good required that all ideas of confiscation or further disfranchisement be abandoned; which was laid on the table. The eyes and nays being called for upon the motion to reconsider, it was lost by 61 nays to 46 ayes—16 being absent. The Governor addresses the Convention by invitation to-night.

ATLANTA, January 17.—With some dissenting votes, the Convention adopted a resolution thanking Gen. Meade for the course he has pursued in regard to reconstruction. The President laid a letter before the Convention from a Connecticut firm engaged in the guano importation, stating that it had lost an order from Savannah for 3,000 tons, and could not collect for what had already been furnished Georgia planters, on account of the action of the Convention in forbidding legal collections, and protesting against such action, as tending to destroy the credit of the South. Three additional sections of the bill of rights were adopted.

NEW ORLEANS, January 17.—In the Convention, to-day, the Committee on Contingent Expenses submitted a report recommending that, on account of the exorbitant prices charged for stationery, etc., that the bills shall not be ordered for payment, unless at a discount of fifty per cent. The article adopted yesterday, providing for the election of District Judges, was reconsidered and rejected; pending discussion, adjourned.

JACKSON, Miss., January 17.—In the Convention, to-day, the following were referred to appropriate committees: Resolutions to appoint a special committee to inquire as to the propriety of removing the Capitol of the State to some more loyal and convenient place; an ordinance forbidding corporations, &c., to levy a poll tax exceeding \$1; resolutions authorizing the Legislature to provide for repairing the Mississippi River levees; pronouncing generous levying in a poll tax; an ordinance declaring, among other essential qualifications for electors, acceptance of civil and political equality all men, and an obligation never to countenance the secession of the State from the United States; resolution requesting the Committee on Ordinances to report an ordinance providing for the abolishment of County Courts and enlarging the powers and jurisdiction of magistrates. The following were adopted: a resolution providing a committee of five to receive the names of citizens in whose behalf Congress shall be petitioned for removal of disabilities; a resolution instructing the Committee on Schedule to report an ordinance providing hereafter no official bond be required from persons elected or appointed to office in this State, but providing fine, imprisonment and perpetual disfranchisement for malfeasance in office.

RICHMOND, January 17.—In the Convention to-day, nothing of importance was transacted.

RALEIGH, January 17.—The Convention to-day adopted rules of order. The Committee on Constitution reported an order drafting that instrument. Mr. Rodman, of Beaufort, offered an ordinance providing relief for the people; which was referred to the Committee of the Whole for discussion. Mr. Durham, of Cleveland, (conservative), offered resolutions declaring that the people of North Carolina are sincerely desirous to resume Constitutional relations with the Government and sister States, and acknowledges the power of Congress to enforce the Reconstruction Acts; but they believe them unwise, unconstitutional, unjust and oppressive, &c.; which lies over.
