CHARLESTON, July 21.—Arrived—Steamer Manhattan, New York; the schooner Mandana, New York. Sailed—Steamer Falcon, Baltimore. ATLANTA, July 21.—The House of Representatives ratified the Constitutional Amendment to-day. SAVANNAH, July 21.—A quarrel ensued between the members of a negro excursion party, on board of the steamer Ajax, to-day, and four negroes were dangerously stabbed. A drunken negro fell overboard, and was drowned. NEW ORLEANS, July 21.—Later advices from Millican, Texas, confirm reports of serious disturbances. It is doubtful if they are yet quieted. The telegraph has been interrupted. No advices later than the 18th. At the suggestion of Governor Warmouth, a joint resolution was passed by the Senate, yesterday, calling upon the Commanding General for troops to repress lawlessness in the Northern and Western Parishes of Louisiana; a memorial having been received from Franklin Parish, with ten signatures, setting forth that at least fifty murders have been committed in that and adjoining Parishes lately. WASHINGTON, July 21.—The Senate remained in session till midnight. The military bill was passed. It reduces the army to 20,000. Three infantry and one cavalry regiment shall be colored. It musters out all except the West Point band. Gives 1,000 Springfield rifles to each District, on condition that the Secretary of War shall be satisfied that the militia are loyal. The last provision excited a sharp debate—Drake saying, that he would, if he had his way, arm every loyal man in the Southern States with a Springfield rifle and cartridges ab libitum; and, so far as he was concerned, he was perfectly willing for it to be written on this bill, that these arms were intended for the protection of the loyal men at the polls. In the Senate, a concurrent resolution was adopted, that the fourteenth amendment to the Constitution has been duly adopted, passed. A resolution, providing for paying Southern Senators from the beginning of the Fortieth Congress, meeting with opposition, went over under the rules. A motion was made to adjourn on Friday, which drew from Hendricks the remark that the President would properly avail himself of the constitutional ten days to defeat the military bill, which arms the Southern militia, at the option of the Secretary of War. A debate of great bitterness ensued, in which alleged outrages on Southern loyalists were again ventilated. Without definite action, the Senate took a recess. In the House, a resolution paying the members from the South from the day of their election, passed. A bill changing ports of entry from Plymouth to Edenton and Beaufort to Port Royal, passed. A resolution seating the Alabama members provoked a long debate. Bulkeley, Calis, Haughey, Morris and Pierce were seated. A concurrent resolution, declaring the fourteenth article duly adopted, passed. The vote in the Republican caucus to-day showed 80 favoring a recess to September or October, against 28 favoring a regular adjournment. Full Cabinet meeting to-day, including Mr. Evarts, for the first time. Gillem's report regarding Mississippi, says both parties charge fraud, but he can find none that are within military reach. As the Constitution was defeated, and military rule will continue, Gillem recommends modification of the law, whereby all registered and qualified voters may fill vacancies which exist or may occur in civil, State or national offices. CINCINNATI, July 21.—Three men implicated in the recent express robbery near Seymour, Indiana, were hung by a mob to-day. HAVANA, July 21.—The cholera is disappearing; the decrease is reported sporadic in character.

THE LEGISLATURE.

FOURTEENTH DAY'S PROCEEDINGS. SENATE.

COLUMBIA, July 21.—The Senate convened at 12 o'clock. After prayer by the Chaplain and the confirmation of the journal, the President laid before the Senate the report of the President and Directors of the Bank of the State of South Carolina, which was ordered to be printed. A petition was received from Wm. Hill, of Abbeville District, praying the removal of his political disabilities, and referred to the Committee on Disabilities. Corbin, from the Judiciary Committee, made an unfavorable report on the bill "enabling persons having worked under contract, to recover pay for their labor, when said contract is not complied with." Ordered for consideration to-morrow. The joint resolution, repealing the resolution adopted by the General Assembly, in 1836, whereby three months' notice of intention to apply for acts of incorporation, was read a second time, and ordered to be sent to the House for concurrence. The bill to validate all ordinances adopted by the late Constitutional Convention, was read a second time, and referred to the Judiciary Committee. The same disposition was made of the bill to continue in force, until repealed, all General and Special Orders issued by the Military Commanders of this State, during the existence of its Provisional Government.

The bill accepting the benefits of the Act of Congress of July 2, 1862, donating public lands for the purposes of agricultural colleges, was read a second time and passed. The bill providing for the election of military officers in incorporated cities and towns, was read the first time and appropriately referred. The Chair announced that, in compliance with the authority conferred on him, he had appointed Mr. F. G. DeFontaine, of the Charleston Daily News, photographer of the House. Crews offered a resolution, which was adopted, instructing the Committee on Incorporations to investigate and report whether any companies or corporations applying for renewal of their charters have discharged any of their employees on account of their political opinions. The report of the President and Directors of the Bank of the State was received and ordered to be printed. Smalls offered a resolution to provide for the removal of the Court House of Beaufort County from Gilsonville to Beaufort. Referred to the Judiciary Committee. The Committee on Privileges and Elections were authorized, by resolution, to employ a clerk, at the same pay as an assistant sergeant-at-arms. Hyde, from Greenville, offered a bill to invalidate all sales of property made by the Confederate Government for non-payment of taxes on confiscated property, which was read and referred to the Committee on Claims. The House then adjourned.
