London, November 21.—Betrans thus far, show 810 liberals and 168 conservatives elected. Serious riots have occurred in various places. ALEXANDRIA, VA., November 21.—Hon. J. S. Pendleton, formerly member of Congress from the 5th District, also Minister to Chili, is dead.

WASHINGTON, November 21.—The Government approves Reverdy Johnson's official proceedings, and is pleased with his progress. A strong effort will be made to have the Alabama Claims Commission sit in New York, instead of London.

Internal revenue for the week only \$1,500,000.

Rear Admiral Davis' report proves that Lopez, of Paraguay, is desirous of maintaining friendly relations with the United States.

Despatches from Salt Lake say three roughs were hung at Bear City on the 11th, creating great excitement. A mob of 200 attacked the town and burned the *Index* office and the jail. The citizens fought them off, killing twenty and wounding thirty-five. The mob collected in the mountains, and sent word to the women and children to leave the town. 400 men intend to attack and burn the town. The Mayor telegraphed for troops.

LOWELL, MASS., November 21.—A fire occurred to-day, in which three persons perished, including a girl of fifteen.

SAN FRANCISCO, November 21.—An earthquake cracked the wall of the Court House in Millerton, Fresno County, on the 5th. There was a slight shock at Austin, Nevada, on the 17th.

NEW YORK, November 21.—A *habeas corpus* has been applied for Col. Treadwell, imprisoned for alleged naturalization fraud.

The cigar manufacturers' association have resolved to discharge and refuse to employ any members of the Cigar-makers' Union.
