Paris, December 19.—Napoleon and Eugenie visited Queen Isabella. Changes in the French ministry are regarded as a confirmation of Napoleon's programme of liberality at home and peace abroad. London, December 19.—The Greeks sent two war ships to Syria, to enforce free entrance to that harbor. The French, British and Russian Governments have, each, one war vessel at Syria. Robert Pasha don't attempt to blockade Syria. He allowed two Greek ships to enter. Constantinople, December 19.—The Sultan's ultimatum to Greece has been confirmed. The Greek ship Erosia ran into Syria, damaged in a conflict with a Turkish cruiser. London, December 19.—The announcement of the sinking of the Greek steamer Erosia is not confirmed officially. It is reported that Robert Pasha, at the request of the French Admiral in the Archipelago, would await an order from the Turkish Government, before coercing the Erosia. The utter inability of the great powers of Europe to control the action of Greece in the pending troubles with Turkey, excited distrust in financial circles here, and a general falling off in all moneyed values is feared. The press of London unite in urging the great powers to a final remonstrance.

News Items. Charleston, December 19.—Arrived—steamer Sea Gull, Baltimore; barque W. G. Putnam, New York. Sailed—steamer Champion, New York. San Francisco, December 19.—Mexico City advices, of the 3d inst., state that Rosencranz had arrived and was cordially received. Providence, R. I., December 19.—Dr. A. Parson, an eminent surgeon, died to-day, aged 88. He was surgeon of the flag-ship Lawrence, in the battle on Lake Erie, and the last surviving officer of Perry's fleet.

Affairs in Washington. Washington, December 19.—The Supreme Court orders, in the Holmes Foundry versus the United States, a reversal of the decision of the Louisiana Circuit Court. The case was remanded to said Court for further proceedings. \$50,000 in fractional currency was shipped to Charleston to-day. Pomeroy introduced a bill requiring the Constitutional Convention in Georgia to re-assemble and make an express provision in the fundamental law that all citizens may hold office, irrespective of race or color. A resolution offered by Harlan was adopted, requesting the Judiciary Committee to frame a bill re-appointing representation in Congress, according to section 2 of the 14th amendment. In the Senate, the Chair presented a memorial of 1,500 citizens of Stockholm, who desired assistance to immigrate. Kellogg presented the Louisiana Legislature's resolutions condoling with Stevens' death. The Judiciary Committee was instructed to consider the appointment of representation in accordance with the fourteenth amendment.
