Foreign News.
Paris, October 26.—The police caution good citizens to guard against imprudent curiosity, which may expose them to danger from the enforcement of the law against mobs.
Tientsin, October 26.—During the insurrection at Tientsin, the rebels captured the fort and massacred the garrison. The rebels were repulsed at other points.
Madrid, October 26.—The Cortes, equally with the Cabinet, are divided regarding a candidate for the throne; unless a compromise is effected, the establishment of a monarchy is impossible.
**Three principal parties in Cortes have each appointed seven deputies to hold a conference and try to come to some agreement in regard to the selection of a King. There was a disturbance at Barcelona Arain yesterday. Cries were given of "the republic," and other sedition demonstrations were made, but the outbreak was inconsiderable and easily suppressed. The town is now tranquil. Deputies to Cortes from Porto Rico have petitioned the Government to refrain from legislation for that colony for the present.
Havana, October 26.—The decree of the Constituent Cortes, establishing unrestricted liberty of religion in Cuba and Porto Rico, was promulgated and has gone into effect as the law of the land. The document is exceedingly liberal in its terms, and declares that Spain cannot remain removed from the general movement of Europe and the world, and adds that this consideration is more powerful for the Antilles, because they lie near a continent where the liberty of religion is recognized by law. One clause of the decree provides that no person shall be prevented from holding office under the Government by reason of religious belief. The decree was received with general satisfaction by the populace.**

Washington News.

Washington, October 26.—Michael H. Collins has been appointed appraiser of merchandise at Charleston, S. C.
**Assistant Treasurer Butterfield has resigned, and Grant and Boutwell are consulting over the resignation. There will be no regular Cabinet meeting to-day, as Grant departs Northward at noon.

Geo. Butler, (Ben's nephew,) has been appointed Consul General to British India, with headquarters at Calcutta.
Delano decides that vintners selling their own produce at the place of manufacture are not subject to the special liquor tax.
The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers of the United States and Canada, nearly every State and Province represented, lately in session at Baltimore, visited Grant, who said, in reply to a speech:
GENTLEMEN: I am very glad to meet you as the representative class of one of the branches of industry of our country, which does more towards its development than any other. Without the aid of railroads, the interior of so vast a country as we have could be made of but very little use. You have my best wishes, gentlemen, for your success and prosperity.

Domestic News.

ALBANY, October 23.—A fire broke out last night in the crockery warehouse of Van Hensen, Charles & Co., on James street, in this city, and caused a loss estimated at \$60,000 on building and stock. Several firemen were injured, but none seriously. While the members of the fire department were engaged there, another fire broke out in Beaver street, in a house occupied as a saloon by Henry Buchanan. Several persons were in the upper part of this building, some of whom escaped, but the exit of the others was cut off. A man named John Pruyn, son of the late Samuel C. Pruyn, leaped from a front window and was killed. It is reported that others perished in the flames. Several persons were badly injured. Loss heavy.
SAN FRANCISCO, October 26.—Riley and Cannon fought ninety-three rounds, when darkness interrupted the proceedings and the battle was declared drawn.
BUFFALO, N. Y., October 26.—A severe snow storm prevails. Two inches of snow has fallen at Toronto, and two feet at points North and West.
New York, October 26.—The celebrated cotton case of the United States vs. C. K. Stevenson, was decided in favor of Stevenson to-day, the Judge holding that the cotton in question never belonged to the Confederate Government, and instead of being shipped to New York in violation of the Act of Congress, was shipped from a Confederate port to a foreign country, in violation of the blockade of Wilmington. But this could not change the title or work a forfeiture to the United States unless seized as a prize of war.
WILMINGTON, October 26.—The case of the officers of the Cuba was resumed to-day, before the Commissioner. Mr. Davis, for the defence, wanted to introduce some of the officers as witnesses. Mr. Phelps, for the Government, objected. After some discussion, the Commissioner decided that the officers were competent as witnesses. After an examination of two witnesses, eliciting nothing of importance, the Court adjourned over until to-morrow.
AUGUSTA, October 26.—Edward Cody, a citizen of Warrenton, Warren County, was taken from his house, last night, by a party of Federal soldiers. While being carried out of town, Cody escaped, with two gun-shot wounds. The Sheriff reported the outrage to the military authorities. The affair creates much ill-feeling.
