

Our Washington correspondent calls attention to the fact that just before the close of the last session of Congress, the Election Committee reported that the Hon. W. D. Simpson, Democrat, whose election was contested by Mr. Wallace, radical, had a prima facie title to his seat. Mr. Simpson was not sworn in, and the case may not be decided before the middle of the winter. It will be remembered that Mr. Simpson was elected by about 4,000 majority.—*Charleston News.*

**HARD TIMES OUT WEST.**—The Chicago Tribune says the financial prospect is not a satisfactory one. Throughout the North-west the general prosperity depends so largely upon the grain crop that the present low prices make everybody feel poor, and have a depressing effect upon all branches of business. It is probable that this fall's business will be done for very small profits, and in many instances no profits at all.

**THE DEVIL'S TEA POT.**—The Rev. Mr. Pollock, preacher in the Presbyterian Church, residing near Warrenton, on being approached lately by a gentleman engaged in distilling in Fauquier County, upon the subject of the latter's admission into church membership, replied that there would be no difficulty about the matter, provided he would agree in future to "let the devil boil his own tea pot."

The Presbyterian Church bids fair to be re-united. According to returns received by the editors of the New York Observer, two-thirds of all the Presbyteries have voted to ratify the re-union of the church. The two General Assemblies will accordingly meet at Pittsburgh, November 10, to count the votes and officially announce the result.

Paris telegrams report that a widespread conspiracy against the Turkish Government has been discovered, and that the provincials in Albania and Herzegovina were in accord with the anti-Austrian revolutionists in Dalmatia. The Emperor Francis Joseph will, it is said, act in union with the Sultan for the suppression of both movements.

**A PRUSSIAN COTTON CLAIM.**—At Washington, a day or two since, counsel laid the cotton claim of George S. Werbom, a Prussian subject, before Baron Von Grolch, the Prussian Minister, who will call for a commission to act upon it at an early day. This claim amounts to \$113,000 in gold.

A St. Paul nigger tried to kill a colored friend with a brick, but, sad to relate, he failed in his laudable undertaking, and broke a \$300 pane of glass. He says it would have been money in his pocket if he had missed the window and killed half a dozen niggers.

The Unionville Times says that the "energy, tact and ability" exhibited by Governor Scott in "raising the means and credit of the State finances in order to complete the Blue Ridge Railroad, will be to him an everlasting monument."

A man named Stone, sixty years old, hung himself to a tree in an orchard, near Bloomington, Ind., a few days ago, rising from his bed at midnight and taking a bride veil for the purpose. He was found dead the next morning.

The wicked New York papers publish the following: "Samuel Hecht was found dead in his bed in New York, his cold hand clenching a Saturday's Tribune containing an essay on political economy. It had killed him."
