

Another Land Swindle.
The charges of theft, robbery and fraud against the "Scott Ring," and their understrappers, are so frequent that they have almost ceased to create surprise. But a few weeks ago, the State was robbed of \$90,000 in one transaction of the Land Commission. Now we are called upon to record another nearer home, and the facts of which all of our people, both white and black, are well acquainted with. Two tracts of land, known as the "Jack Hood" and "Tosser" places, have been purchased by the Land Commission. The facts of the case are as follows: These two tracts (1,004 acres) were purchased by J. F. G. Mittag 18 months ago, for one dollar and fifty cents per acre. Repeated efforts to sell the land to the State by Mittag failed, and needing the assistance of other parties to carry out his designs, he called to his aid one Middleton S. Gill, and R. J. Donaldson, the State Senator from Chesterfield. Mittag, to relieve himself from all further connection with the matter, apparently, sells the 1,004 acres to Gill for \$2,000, but at the same time signs the deed for three thousand—a suspicious circumstance to say the least. Mittag sold the land to Gill in April, 1870; but we find, by reference to the Clerk's office, that sale to the Land Commission by Gill took place January 20, 1870—three months before the titles passed from Mittag to Gill.

If this is not a strange proceeding in legal matters, we are at a loss to comprehend. The Land Commission paid Gill \$8 per acre—\$8,032 for the 1,004 acres—a clear gain to Gill, Donaldson and Mittag, of \$6,000. The land is known to be utterly worthless, and there is not a colored or white man in this County who would accept it as a free gift from the State and be compelled to depend upon it for a support. We understand the colored people are preparing a protest against the purchase, which will be presented to the Advisory Board. We think, if the colored people will sift this and other matters thoroughly, in which these men have been engaged for the last two years, they will arrive at a just appreciation of their services to the interest of the colored race.

The above facts are without exaggeration, and received the assent of a prominent colored radical, before they were put in type.—Lancaster Ledger.

The investigation has evidently been conducted with a view of covering up and hiding under the wings of the bird of freedom, as far as possible, the disposition of the golden harvest reaped by the national "moral agriculturist," while the saintly warrior, with the air of a martyr, his hands folded meekly across his Christian breast, awaits his doom. The impersonation of cant and thrift, he has by the exercise of the one succeeded in the other. Although he may get off this time, and possibly have the thanks of Congress for the zeal displayed as a patriotic professional philanthropist, there is "one little spot" that the minority report hints at that all the water in the sea cannot wash away. It is a "damned spot" that "will not out" of "the blood of all the Howards."

In an affray at Pawtucket, R. I., Sunday night, Charles E. Kent, a street car conductor, stabbed and instantly killed Joseph R. Whiting, and also stabbed, perhaps fatally, Louisa Whiting, a daughter of the murdered man. A family difficulty was the cause of the affray.
