

Interesting European Intelligence.

Paris, September 5.—The following official proclamation has been issued by the new Government: "The Decheance has been pronounced in the Corps Legislatif, and the Republic has been proclaimed at the Hotel de Ville. The Government of the National Defence, composed of eleven members, and all deputies of Paris, has been constituted and ratified by popular acclamation. Their names are, Arago, Emanuel Cremieux, Jules Favre, Jules Ferry, Gambetta, Garnier Pages, Rochefort and Jules Simon. Gen. Trochu will at the same time continue in the exercise of the powers of the government of Paris, and is appointed Minister of War in place of Gen. Faidherbe.

"Please placard immediately, and, if necessary, have proclaimed by a public order this declaration for the government of the National Defence.

"The Minister of the Interior, "LEON GAMBETTA."

An important fraction of the Chambers met at President Schneider's residence, and seem disposed to act independent of the provisional government, to whom they have sent delegations. Officers and soldiers place themselves under the new government of France.

The Tirouers of Paris guard the ministries and public offices. It is understood the government will convolve the Constituent Assembly.

The journals unanimously urge the nation to make an unyielding defence, and declare the dismemberment of France impossible. They say the King of Prussia declared he was only warring against Napoleon. If it becomes evident that he is now warring against the French people, the struggle must be one of extermination. The fleet must be ordered to treat the sea-ports of Germany as the Prussian armies treat the towns of Alsace and Lorraine. The enemy must be made to feel that united Republican France can accomplish. All men here must bear arms.

The following circular despatch has been sent by the Minister of the Interior to the prefects of all the departments:

"PARIS, September 4.—General Trochu, Governor of Paris, has been appointed a member of the Government of National Defence, and installed at the Hotel de Ville. He takes the portfolio of war and his colleagues have conferred upon him the Presidency."

LONDON, September 5.—The officers of the Provisional Government are distributed as follows: Minister of Interior, Leon Gambetta; Foreign Affairs, Jules Favre; Finance, Pierre Magne; Public Instruction, Jules Simon; Justice, Emanuel Cremieux; War, Trochu; President of the Council, Grevy; Secretary General, Anored Averjon.

Seals have been placed on the doors of the Corps Legislatif. LONDON, September 6.—A Bavarian Corps escort 90,000 French prisoners from Sedan to Prussia. Faidherbe's death is denied.

The Daily News says Jules Favre, the Foreign Minister, has already made peace proposals—involving the withdrawal of the Prussians and the abolition of the French standing army. The Times and other London journals favor the French revolution, as a clear expression of the national will; they anticipate no disorder. The names of the Paris streets have already been changed. Avenue L'Empereur becomes Rue Victor Noir.

LONDON, September 6.—Congratulatory declarations have reached France from Republican Committees of several nations. Great numbers of Republicans are already leaving London for Paris. Victor Hugo reached Paris last night.

PARIS, September 6.—Gen. Venger's corps reached Sedan on its retrograde march. The corps is intact and is falling back in good order.

PARIS, September 6.—Notwithstanding the dominance of the mob, public order is maintained. Etienne Arago, in taking possession of Paris as Mayor, in the name of the Republic, issued a stirring address, recalling the patriotic events of '72, '30 and '48. He concludes: Citizens, I speak to you now, as our fathers did in '92. Citizens, the country is in danger; rally around this Parisian municipality, defended from siege by a soldier of the Republic. Vive la Republique!

BRUSSELS, September 6.—The Prince de Joinville, Duc d'Arnauld, and Duc de Charlie have left Brussels, to offer their swords to the French Republic.

PARIS, September 6.—The police are incorporated with the National Guard. It is reported that the Italian troops have entered Rome. It is also reported that Jules Favre has gone to meet King William. McMahon's death is contradicted. Rouher quitted France last night.

PARIS, September 6.—The Empress left the palace by the entrance of the quay, accompanied by one servant, in the morning. Ferdinand d'Lesseps, a kinsman of the Empress, advised her to sign the abdication. She proceeded to the hall, where the Ministers are in session for this purpose. The Ministers advised her not to sign. The Princess Clotilde was the last of the Imperial family to leave the palace. The appearance of the Imperial apartments indicates a hasty departure. The person left in charge of the palace said all those to whom the Empress had been so kind, abandoned her—not one remained to see her off. Nothing in the palace was injured.

A strong force has been posted around the public buildings. The Provisional Government makes known that it will permit no vandalism.

PARIS, September 6.—3 P. M.—Bazaine holds out at Metz. The total French force under arms, including the 700,000 Nationale and Garde Mobile, is 7,000,000. It is stated that Count Palikao and Henri Chevreau, late Minister of the Interior, are in Belgium. They fled during the crisis preceding the declaration of the

Republic. It is rumored that a strong Italian column is marching on Rome.

BRUSSELS, September 6.—The Prince Imperial has left Rome for England. The Empress Eugenie arrived in Belgium on Sunday. The Prussians are advancing on Paris by forced marches.

PARIS, September 6.—The destruction of the Strasbourg library has been confirmed.

Victor Hugo returned and was received with an ovation.

Gambetta has appointed Edmund Valentine Prefect of Strasbourg and Karlsruhe. The country depends upon his energy and patriotism to reach and defend his post.

The Prussians are crossing the Rhine in the vicinity of Mulhausen. The National Guard has gone to meet them.

LONDON, September 6.—The Pall Mall Gazette says: The question now is, shall France, rid of the Emperor, be compelled to pay for his sins by the sacrifice of Alsace and Lorraine? The difficulty is presently to be solved by the Prussian advance to Paris. Open air meetings continue in England favoring neutrality. There was a vast meeting of this sort at Birmingham last night. Grammont arrived at Dover, England, and is ready to join the new government at Paris in a Chinese war. Chevreau is at Brussels. The Prussian papers continue their assaults upon England's pretended neutrality and proposed intervention.

The Carlists are strong in the Basque provinces. A band, 1,000 strong, was seen at Cabellas.

LONDON, September 6.—The Standard learns that as soon as a stable government is established in France, England will join her in a great war against China, to assure the safety of Europeans in China.

The Times says the crisis may be postponed for several months, but the Sultan's submission will be the end of it.

An uprising is reported in Italy, and a great war is believed imminent.

The deposits in the Bank of France, it is said, have been removed.

The Prince Imperial reached London to-day.

McMahon died at Namur, Belgium. The Professors of the Roman Catholic Theology convened at Nuremberg, to demand a new Council, to reverse the unlawful proceeding of the Council of the Vatican.

The Republic has been proclaimed in Havre, Marseille, Lille, Nantes, Perquere and Montpellier. The journals of Paris support the new government in the national defence, discarding all other considerations. The Journal Officiel de la Republique expects the army to rally around the glorious flag which, eighty years ago, drove back all Europe. The new government has recalled the present French Ministers at London, Vienna and St. Petersburg. A new decree has been issued requiring the withdrawal of all Germans from Paris. Keraty, Prefect of Police, addressing the policemen and citizens, says: The revolution just taken place has been pacific. It was understood that no French blood should be spilled except on the field of battle. It has for its object, as in '92, repression of the foreign foe. France, under the auspices of republican liberty, is prepared to vanquish or die. My power shall only be used to defend you from the blows of those who seek to betray the country.

MADRID, September 6.—There is intense excitement over French affairs. Perfect order is maintained.

Six hundred Carlists were defeated in Navarre and many captured. Among them was an armed priest. Another band of 400 were encountered in Biscay while attempting to destroy the railroad. Prim says the only public service left him is resignation.

It is rumored that a conspiracy has been discovered. The adherents of Montpensier are implicated.

CHICAGO, September 5.—A destructive fire occurred to-day. The loss aggregates \$2,500,000. Insurance, \$1,000,000.

NEW YORK, September 6.—The bark Arthur, from Baltimore for Portland, Maine, foundered. Crew will be saved.

NEW YORK, September 6.—Mayor Hall, to-day, received a despatch from the Mayor of Paris, announcing the formation of the French Republic. Flags were at once displayed on the City Hall, in honor of the event.

WASHINGTON, September 6.—The Assistant Commissioner of Internal Revenue has officially stated that the period within which spirit metres must be attached and adjusted for use in distilleries, under regulations of June 7th, 1870, Series five, Number five, is extended sixty days, from the 7th inst.

AUGUSTA, September 6.—A bill has passed the Georgia House of Representatives prohibiting whipping as punishment for crime. The militia bill failed to pass the House.


