

SECRETARY FISH DISPLEASED WITH MR. WASHBURN.—The New York correspondent of the Philadelphia Ledger, writing on Sunday, says: Secretary Fish is in town to-day. He is said to express himself very freely with respect to what are called the incautious utterances of Minister Washburne against the Administration for not taking a more active part with a view of putting an end to the war. As soon as those utterances can be substantiated by correspondence by mail, there is authority for saying that Mr. Washburne will be called upon to explain them, or vacate his office. The Secretary adheres to the conviction that there is, at present, absolutely no opening for American mediation, nor is the situation likely to present one until the fate of Paris is decided.
