A FIRST-RATE DESCRIPTION OF THE LINCOLN STATUE IN NEW YORK.—A faithful object has been placed in Union square, it is said to be a statue of Abraham Lincoln. But it does not resemble Mr. Lincoln. The lines which gave the face character are not there. But the sculptor has tried to atone for this defect by putting plenty of hard lines in the clothes, which are enough to distract anybody who thinks that dress need not of necessity increase the hideousness of man. The mind has not conceived such a pair of pantaloons as that which the artist has put on this statue. To increase the beauty of their effect, the designer of the work has clapped a Roman toga over the upper part of the figure, thus combining the costume of the past and the present in a manner never yet dreamed of by caricaturists. There never was such a statue seen in this world before. It is like the hideous nightmare which people have after supping on roast pork and lobster salad.
