

DISRAELI'S ALLUSION TO QUEEN VICTORIA.—The essential part of Mr. Disraeli's remarks at Hugelunden, concerning which a sensational telegraphic report was made, was as follows:

The health of the Queen has for several years been a subject of anxiety to those about her, but it is only within this last year that the country generally has become acquainted with the gravity of that condition. I believe I may say that there is some improvement in her Majesty's health, but I fear a long time must elapse before it will reach that average condition which she has for some time enjoyed, and I do not think we can conceal from ourselves that a still longer time must elapse before her Majesty will be able to resume the performance of those public and active duties which it was once her pride and pleasure to fulfill, because they brought her into constant and immediate contact with her people. The fact is, we cannot conceal from ourselves the fact that her Majesty is physically incapacitated from performing those duties, but it is some consolation to her Majesty's subjects to know that in the performance of those much higher duties which her Majesty is called upon to perform, she is still remarkable for a punctuality and precision which have never been surpassed and rarely equaled by any monarch of these realms. A very erroneous impression is prevalent respecting the duties of the sovereign of this country. Those duties are multifarious; they are weighty and they are unceasing. I will venture to say that no head of any department in the State performs more laborious duties than fall to the sovereign of this country. There is not a despatch received from abroad, nor one sent from this country, which is not submitted to the Queen. The whole internal administration of this country greatly depends upon the sign manual, and of our present sovereign it may be said that her signature has never been placed to any public document of which she did not know the purpose and of which she did not approve. Those Cabinet Councils of which you all hear, and which are necessarily the scene of anxious and important deliberations are reported and communicated on their termination by the Minister to the sovereign, and they often call from her critical remarks, necessarily requiring considerable attention. And I will venture to add, that no person likely to administer the affairs of this country would treat the suggestions of her Majesty with indifference, for at this moment there is probably no person living in this country who has such complete control over the political traditions of England as the sovereign herself.

A LEGEND OF THE RHINE.—A correspondent of the New York Evening Post has picked up the following in his wanderings along the Rhine: More than 900 years ago, a young knight, seeking adventure along the Rhine, saw, fell in love with, and became betrothed to, the fair Hildegunde, most beautiful of Rhineland damsels, daughter of Henribert, Lord of the Seven Mountains. A day was appointed for the nuptials, and the bride-maidens selected, but Charlemagne suddenly summoned Roland to attend him during the crusade, and the marriage was postponed till the Count's return. Meanwhile news came of his death, and Hildegunde, too credulous, took the veil and became a nun at the convent on the island of Nonnenworth. But Roland was not dead; in time he came back, scarred and famous, eager to claim his bride. She was, of course, inaccessible; so he built Roland-seck, the castle on the rock which overlooks the convent, and paid his devotions to watching Hildegunde when she walked about the gardens. Whatever their motives for seclusion, the patience of the lover must have persuaded the nuns that the fickleness of man was no sufficient ground for abandoning the world. The sex was not so bad after all. What has made this convent of Nonnenworth famous but that love it was built to neutralize? When the bell tolled for Hildegunde's funeral, Roland sunk into silence, and was found dead, his glazed eyes still turned towards the convent. The romance of the story has lasted longer than the castle.
