WHAT A ONE-ARMED MAN CAN DO.—A correspondent of the *Fredericksburg* (Va.) *Star* writes from Prince William County:

"One of my neighbors, Mr. George Williams, is a young Confederate soldier, who has lost an arm, near the shoulder, and yet can do more work than a majority of young men with two hands. I have seen him, with the assistance of a small boy, load a wagon that four oxen could with difficulty draw. He cuts hoop poles with one hand, and with the assistance of his teeth ties them into bundles, as rapidly and as well as others with both hands. He plows his land himself, and drives a two-horse wood wagon, loading and unloading it himself. He is an honest, brave and good citizen."

A MODEL BOY.—Writes a correspondent of the *Rome* (Ga.) *Courier*:

A little boy of Polk County, John William Armstrong, only ten years old, recently picked with his own hands 916 pounds of cotton in five days. Of this amount, he picked 604 pounds in three days, and 211 pounds in one day. On Friday night, it rained so, that he did not pick on Saturday. He excelled the best pickers in the field, leading the other hands who competed with him. I visited the family—found father and mother and all sick, and this brave little fellow cooked for the whole family."

THE following extract from the "Election Law" is published for general information:

Sec. 9. All bar-rooms, saloons and other places for the sale of liquor by retail, shall be closed at 6 o'clock of the evening preceding the day of such election, and remain closed until 6 o'clock in the morning of the day thereafter, and during the time aforesaid, the sale of intoxicating liquors is prohibited. Any person duly convicted before a competent court of a violation of this section, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding ninety days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court.

The regular and special policemen have been instructed to report all violations of above-stated law.
