GEORGIA TO BE RECONSTRUCTED AND AGAIN PUT UNDER MILITARY RULE, -A special to the Louisville Courier-Journal, dated Washington, October 9, says: The leading Government organ of the city— the Washington Chronicle—publishes daily editorial articles, telegrams, &c., in respect to Georgia, charging that the late Democratic majority of 60,000 in that State was the result of intimidation of negroes. There was no disturbance save at two points, and the Democratic gains are general. But though no proof is adduced in support of the charge be-yond the refusal of the whites to let nemselves be driven from the polls at Macon, it is believed by well-informed persons that there is a serious design in Administration circles to throw out the electoral vote of Georgia and to subject that State to a third military reconstruction, in order to further the designs, now only partly accomplished, of Simon Cameron and Secretary Delano upon the Georgia railroads. There will be an en-deavor to work up public opinion so as to furnish excuse for these acts and for excluding the members of Congress to be elected in November next until the organization of the next House of Representatives thall have been perfected. 
