ANOTHER UTAH WAR.—The President has decided to renew his aggressive policy against the Mormons. It will probably take official form in a day or two in a special message to Congress. He had a long conference with the Secretary of State and Attorney-General on the subject, and afterwards visited the Capitol, where he invited members of the Senate and House Judiciary Committees to a similar consultation. The immediate reason for this sudden movement at this stage of the session is founded on a memorial which has been forwarded to the President from the Gentiles in Utah, and which will doubtless be transmitted to Congress with the Executive message. The opinion was expressed by the Administration members at the Capitol that the remedial legislation could be secured before the 1st of March, provided it was in a less offensive shape than the well-known Oullom bill which was defeated in the last Congress. However, an attempt was made in the House, this afternoon, to instruct the Judiciary Committee to report at any time a bill to repeal such of the laws passed by the Territorial Legislature of Utah as were in conflict with the organic Act creating the Territory. Delegate Hooper, who was in hopes that his people were going to escape Federal persecution at this session, fears that the new movement means a bitter and determined fight, which he charges is instigated by a combination of interests to crush out the Mormons.


