In the United States District Court, October 12, Judge Bryan presiding, the following sentences were passed: Edward Brown, for stealing United States property; sentenced to one year's imprisonment at hard labor. James Williams and Samuel Bryon, for the same offence, were sentenced likewise. Geo. W. Brown and Geo. M. Hayward, for stealing United States property, were sentenced to one year's imprisonment in Beaufort County jail. W. O. Miller, for distilling without giving the notice, sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 and costs. On the equity side, F. W. McMaster, of the firm of McMaster, Monteith & Roath, was finally discharged in bankruptcy.

**HORRIBLE ACCIDENT AT THE WASHINGTON NAVY YARD.**—A horrible accident occurred at the navy yard there Saturday afternoon. Edward P. Sipler, a carpenter, employed in managing the four-foot circular saw used at the West-ship-house for cutting timber, was cut to pieces by the huge saw, then revolving at great speed. He was engaged in adjusting the guide, when he was caught and carried forward in front of the saw, which was stopped in a few seconds, but not until it had twice sawed through the body of the unfortunate man, and left his remains a mangled mass of flesh and blood. An undertaker gathered the torn fragments together and bound them into a semblance of the human form.


