Treasury Department,  
State of Florida,  
Comptroller's office,  
Tallahassee, Aug. 30, 1895.  
Tax Collector . . . . . county:

Dear Sir—In view of the general impression prevailing throughout the state that the taxpayers are allowed, by the act of 1895, until the first Monday in October, 1895, in which to pay the taxes of 1894, without additional expense, and for other good reasons, it is deemed best that the tax sales for the unpaid taxes of 1894 should not take place until the first Monday in November, 1895, and you are directed to withhold the tax sale notice until October, and not offer property for sale for the unpaid taxes of 1894, until the first Monday in November, 1895.

The governor concurs with me in this matter.
