SUNDAY'S LECTURES.

Eloquent, Forceful, Scriptural and Profound.

The lecture by Hon. Lou J. Beauchamp Saturday night was in the same happy vein as the others of the series—full of humor and pathos, and bringing laughter and tears as the lecturer touched the different chords of feeling in his hearers. The sermons in the morning and evening, and the lecture in the afternoon, were well attended, by interested audiences. The sermon at the Methodist church last night had for a text the first eight verses of the book of Esther, which described a magnificent Oriental feast in ancient Persia, where "the drinking was according to the law." The application of this text was forcible and eloquent. Mr. Beauchamp has the rare faculty of delving into the Bible and finding spiritual lessons in the most prosaic of its historical records. The impression on the audience was profound, and we have no doubt that the results of these lectures will be seen for years to come in the advancement of the cause of individual temperance and a more rigid curtailment, if not absolute prohibition, of the liquor traffic in Ocala.

Tonight Mr. Beauchamp will give one of his popular lectures. Admission, 25 cents; children, 10 cents. We recommend all to come out and hear this prince of orators in this, the last lecture of the series.

Hon. Hugh E. Miller died at 11 o'clock this morning at his residence on North Sanchez street, this city.

Dr. Thompson and several other physicians were in attendance. He passed away very gently, and was conscious till a few minutes before death. He talked quite freely with Rev. J. P. Hilburn, who was with him when he died.

In the death of Hon. Hugh E. Miller our city loses one of its best known citizens, and the bar one of its brightest attorneys.


