A CHAPTER OF CALAMITIES

E. C. Hood Shot—Operation on Mr. Collins—Willie's Pistol Was Loaded. Close Shave for Al. Redgers—A Slight Offset

Dr. E. Van Hood returned today from Dunnellon, where he went yesterday morning to see E. C. Hood, who was shot in the thigh by the marshal, who was shooting at a refractory negro. The wounded man is doing well.

His Chances are Even

Uncle J. M. Collins, who lives a few miles north of Ocala, on the Kendrick road, was operated on Saturday by Doctors Hood and Hood and a huge tumor removed from his back, between the shoulders. The tumor has been growing steadily worse for the past year, and the old gentleman was rapidly declining and the operation was his only chance. He is critically ill, and the chances of life or death are about even.

Accidentally Shot

Willie Smith, aged eight years, a colored boy, was accidentally shot in the abdomen Sunday by a playmate with a 38 calibre revolver. He was brought to the hospital and in the afternoon, Doctors Hood, Smith, Izlar and Powers operated on him, the technical name of the operation being laparotomy. The intestines and abdomen were pierced by the ball. The boy did not recover from the shock of the wound and died Sunday night.

Shocked by Lightning

Yesterday afternoon, during the rain and thunder storm, Allan Rodgers, road overseer for this, the first road district, while engaged with his men at work on the Ocala and Cotton Plant hard road, a few miles west of the city, was severely shocked by lightning. The bolt struck a dead pine stump close by and set fire to it. The electric current was so severe that Mr. Rodgers was knocked almost senseless and was very sick for several hours, and had to come home and lie down. Almost immediately after this bolt, two others descended close by, in different directions. The men, who were some distance from Mr. Rodgers, were only slightly shocked.

Spragin is Better

Spragin, the young negro who was shot in the hip and cut in the arm by Sam Jones, another negro, at Lochloosa, last Friday, is in the hospital, and is rapidly recovering.

Spencer Wilson Recovering

Spencer Wilson, a worthy colored man, who was employed at Taylor & Meffert's mill, was seriously crushed about the shoulders and chest a few days ago by the falling of the elevator. He would have been instantly killed but for a pile of trash that was under the elevator, which partially broke the fall. He was taken to the hospital and is recovering under the good treatment received there.



A LAND OF BEULAH

It Flows With Milk and Honey and is Heaped With Cotton Bolls and Watermelons

The editor of the Star spent Sunday on South Lake Weir. He saw several orange groves that are "things of beauty" and of financial promise—notably those of Mrs. B. B. Ricker, Mr. Upham and Mrs. Porter. Some of the trees have considerable fruit on them and another season promises great things for the owners.

Many of the people who reside in that section have paid considerable attention to melon growing this season and with gratifying success. Most every farmer has a ten or twenty-acre field. They are busy now marketing them and the roads are alive with wagons hauling the luscious melons to the cars.

Monday morning as we went over to Summerfield, we met Johnson, Smith, Peterson and Rosco's teams all loaded down with watermelons. At the West side, two miles south of Summerfield, a car was being loaded and one at Summerfield by Mr. Branch, and another a mile east of the Summerfield station by Mr. Sigmund. The

latter's neighborhood turned in and by 10 o'clock the car was full.

The quality of the fruit is extraordinarily fine this season. Most of the melons seen Monday would easily tip the beam at 40 pounds.

Messrs. McKinney and Johnson had a field of melons at South Lake Weir ready to pluck that will average 40 pounds.

The melon growers of Summerfield, who usually are among the earliest, are late this season and will not begin shipping before Saturday. They are Sam and Tom Dillard, Alfred Proctor, A. D. Mitchell, and Hardy Johnson, the latter among the most thrifty colored farmers in Marion county.

The successful tomato growers are John Y. Hicks and Mr. Rearden.

Mr. Mitchell is very busy with his crops, having harvested the finest oat crop in his farming experience, while corn, velvet beans, peas and pinders are coming on beautifully. All of these crops will be used in fattening stock for J. W. Davis, the Ocala market man, who is a partner of Mr. Mitchell.

Mr. Nathan Mayo, who is so well known as a late partner in the Anti-Monopoly drug store, is now the leading merchant of the village. He car-
