



Boston, March 9.—Society has just learned of the sudden withdrawal of the invitations to the wedding of Miss Minna Twombly Jones and Captain Arthur Kambler Elder, Baron von Saarberg, of the Austrian army.

The wedding day had been set at St. Cecilia's church. The invitations were withdrawn without explanations, and all the wedding gifts were returned. The telegraph was used to inform the guests expected from New York and other cities, that there would be no wedding.

The cause lay simply in the courage of an American girl, who when she found that she did not want to marry, braved the mortification which must ensue and broke off her engagement.

Miss Jones is a daughter of Mrs. F. William Jones. Through her mother she is related to the Twombly family and by marriage to the Vanderbilts of New York. She is just over twenty, and most of her life up to the time she was fifteen, was spent abroad. She has lived in Boston since then, but has made two trips abroad. Last summer she met Captain Saarberg. He belongs to a regiment of the officers of which must belong to a good family and of fine character. They are select men.

The Austrian fell in love with the beautiful American girl and before the summer was over they were engaged. Miss Jones' mother returned to America, but the young lady remained to study music. She is a fine violinist and has been one of the players in the girls' orchestra which is enlivening the Convent Club festivals and fairs.

The date for the wedding was set as early as possible, the plates for the invitations were engraved and the actual words of the date were left blank until the baron's sailing day should be known. Finally this was announced and the invitations were issued.

Miss Jones came to this country on the steamer with her fiancé, who arrived in Boston last Tuesday. Up to then she had seemed satisfied with her choice and as happy as any girl over the prospect of her marriage. Two days later she said to the baron: "I have engaged myself to marry you and if you insist on it I will do so, but I do not wish it any longer."
