## THE CRUELTY OF FEAR

A Melancholy Example of How the Yellow Fever Panic Robs Men of Mercy and Reason

New Orleans, August 17.—A pathetic case of the results of the quarantine in Mississippi was brought to light when the body of Mrs. Howard Bull was brought here from Ocean Springs. Her husband is the assistant division freight agent of the Illinois Central. When the quarantine was placed on his summer home in Mississippi he moved into New Orleans, leaving his family at the seashore. Several days ago his wife was taken very ill. He tried to break through the Mississippi quarantine, telling the guards the circumstances. They laughed at him. Going to the state health office he fell on his knees and begged to be allowed to go through, but was again turned down. Then another telegram came that his wife was dying in the house alone, and he made another attempt to break through the lines, and was taken by force and put on a train and brought back here. Then the news came that his wife had died and that the body was lying at Ocean Springs. Even then Governor Vardaman's deputies would not allow him to pass the lines, and the only manner in which he was able to have the body buried was to bring it into this city.

DREDGE IS TIED UP

It Was at Work on the Indian River, but the Mosquitoes Made the Lives of the Crew Miserable

Because the mosquitoes are too numerous on the Indian River, the handsome new dredge and snag boat Florida of the United States Engineering Department has been taken out of commission for the next thirty days.

The Florida is now lying at the government dock, foot of Market street. She is under command of Captain O. N. Bie. On or about the 1st of September the Florida will leave port for the Indian River, where she will work for probably a year.

There is much work to be done on the channel of that river, but on account of the numerous mosquitoes in that part of the state the government has taken the dredge out of commission to await the disappearance of the pests.

The Florida is one of the finest river dredges in the department, and will no doubt do excellent work on the Indian river when Captain Bie sets about it.


