OUR SOLDIER BOYS AT ORLANDO

Second Regiment Camp, Orlando, Fla., October 5, 1905. The Rifles arrived at Orlando this afternoon at 2 o'clock and the entire balance of the day was spent in unloading the company supplies, pitching and arranging tents and other things which attend the first day in camp. The location here is a very beautiful one, situated on the old ball grounds in the western part of the city, and numerous picturesque and pretty scenes surround the parade grounds, which are by far the very best in the state for military purposes. Company "A" occupies one of the best situations for their company street, being among old friends, the Gainesville Guards on one side and Company "B" of Leesburg, popular Capt. Kramer's company, on the other, and we anticipate a fine old time in this beautiful South Florida city. Captain Kramer of the Leesburg Rifles is officer of the day, being senior captain of the Second Regiment. It is presumed Captain Nash will follow Captain Kramer, and that Lieutenant Graham will be lieutenant of the guard at the same time.
