LOCAL LEGISLATION

The city council held its regular meeting last night. Councilmen present were: President Gates, McIver, Weathers, McKean, Owen and Ford. Mrs. Helvenston requested permission to redeem city tax certificates on lots 85, 88, 100, 124 and 142, and other property at face value, without interest. Refused, but council said same could be redeemed at face value, with interest. The usual monthly bills were ordered paid and reports of officers filed. Bill of the Hammer for \$11.25 was referred to the clerk for affidavit of publication. Dr. W. P. Wilson asked for a street lamp at the S. A. L. crossing on Exposition street. Granted. The shortage of electric light poles was referred to the light and water committee. Chairman Ford of the finance committee submitted levy for years 1905 and 1906: For bond interest, 6 mills; fire and water, 6 1/2 mills; general purposes, 4 1/2 mills. Total, 17 mills. Accepted. The railroad crossings were reported in bad shape by Chairman McIver. Mr. McIver, City Attorney Biggs and City Clerk Graham were named a committee to ask said railroads to "come across," or trouble would ensue. Council then adjourned.

Mrs. Gottlieb and Mrs. Pearson assisted the smiling hostess in receiving and the glad hand and the cherry welcome was so spontaneous and cordial that it sent a thrill through every caller, and made all feel at home.

At the entrance to the hall leading to the west was constructed a Turkish booth, with an Oriental couch and a curio table, on which many objects of Oriental design were exhibited, and presided over by Mrs. J. B. Cutler, who told their history and use in a very entertaining and instructive manner. Mrs. Cutler was ably assisted by Mrs. J. C. B. Koonce of Sumterville, and Mrs. B. W. Blount. Mrs. Koonce and Mrs. Blount were robed in Oriental splendor, and especially the latter, whose person was graced with a rare Oriental frock.

Misses Edna Dozier, Pauline Sullivan and Mattie Williams, all clothed in Oriental costume, served coffee with a smiling graciousness that made it partake of an extra fine flavor. At the entrance to the dining room was located the piano, and those who touched the keys during the afternoon and struck harmonious and ravishing notes were Mrs. A. L. Izlar, Mrs. Frank Reagan, Mrs. T. H. Johnson and Mrs. G. R. McKean.

Turning to the left your faced the room in which stood the refreshment table, presided over by Meslames Clarence Camp, E. T. Helvenston and Lee Miller. Beyond the refreshment table, in a corner of the room, Mrs. W. J. Chambers welcomed and introduced all callers.

Miss Eloise Izlar, who personated Miss Alice Roosevelt admirably, in a most entertaining and bewitching manner detailed the many pleasing incidents of her remarkable Oriental trip, and the distinguished personages she met. She also gave her version of the Dan Cupid incident with the Sultan of Soudoo, and his startling proposal of marriage to her, and the rare diplomacy she exercised in impressing him with the necessity of reflection on so important an incident in her life.

Fully 200 persons were in evidence during the afternoon, and quite a neat sum was realized in promoting the good work of temperance. In fact so great a success was this experiment that another is shortly to be planned.

The holy vice presidents of the W. C. T. U. from the different churches participated in the reception, and one of the pleasures of the afternoon was to see at the reception Mrs. Fannie R. Gary, who for years was president of the W. C. T. U., and an uncompromising advocate of temperance in its highest, noblest and best sense.
