## THE ANTHONY MEETING

The Anthony demonstration to the candidates Saturday night was a great affair, when it is considered that a weekling rain came down on the just and unjust.

As usual, Anthony covered herself with glory enough, if not more so, for one night. It was this time, and you can judge for yourself. As rapidly as the candidates and their special sponsors drove in, a committee was on hand, consisting of Messrs. Griffin, Stewart and Hon. A. P. Baskin, to inform the aspirants for county political honors that Mr. and Mrs. So and So were expecting them for tea, and no would not be received as an answer—a clever and hospitable reception.

Mr. Frank Turner and the editor fell into the kindly greeting and hospitality of the home of Mr. and Mrs. George Stewart, and fared royally.

The speaking took place in the express shed, east of the depot, where seats were improvised out of filled bean baskets. Committeeman Forbes presided and did the honors most graciously and acceptably.

The order of the speaking was reversed and the legislative candidates wound up the program, while Assessor Ayer and Tax Collector Carney opened the oratorical ball.

These gentlemen we did not hear, because the rain detained us, but judging from J. W. Bishop's remarks in reply to Mr. Carney, the latter informed the audience that Mr. Bishop was no tax payer and hence his claims for office should be considered lightly, but Mr. Bishop, after spreading the scum of eulogy over Mr. C., enlightened him to the effect that he owned a home in Ocala, or would after paying \$200 more of the purchase money, that he bought the property from W. W. C. Platt, and paid the city of Ocala \$20 a year for taxes, and his proportion of county and state taxes. Mr. B. made a ten strike, only Carney's ghost seemed to have scared him a little more than usual, and coming down the home stretch he fairly whizzed.

Following Mr. Bishop came Frank Turner, J. M. Mathews, H. P. Baker and Dr. Baskin. Geo. G. Mathews, E. L. Wirtmann, T. E. Biggs, L. S. Light, and lastly the editor.

It was past ten when Light improvised a rostrum for his altitudinous platform, impressing into the service a railroad gang plank, which he spread over the ramparts of bean crates and mounted the same, and for half an hour held the crowd spellbound, and was the first speaker to have the united attention of the crowd. It was evident that Light felt at home on that rampart of beans, for he is "somewhat growing beans himself, and the way he emitted rays of light on various state matters, which now are all wrong, showed that they would be speedily righted if Light is elected. He did not forget to rap the legal profession and his opponent, T. E. Biggs, got a whack in true artistic Farmer's Alliance style.

Bittinger closed the vocative pyrotechnics. Knew it was late and would simply rap his respects and retire, but the crowd insisted on hearing him, and hear him they did, for when he got through it wasn't far from the midnight hour, and the attention he received was indeed complimentary. He paid his respects to Brother Candidate Light for drawing his comparison on the state levying a rate of 25 per cent. on the tax payer and then turning around and loaning that money to the banks at 2 per cent. The 25 per cent. tax is a penalty on the tax payer, and the state to compel the tax payer to settle his bills promptly. The tax payer is at fault as a negligent debtor; he defies the law and reaps the penalty. He also controverted Light's statement about the state having from \$800,000 to \$1,000,000 to its credit and not paying off its obligations. That money is simply a reserve, held in trust to meet the state's obligations. The state does in this what every prudent, thoughtful and up-to-date business man does in conducting his business—looking ahead to see he always has funds on hand to meet his obligations. Without this foresight he would soon lose his credit and become an object of commercial and financial suspicion. As for the surplus state money, is it not better to loan it out on call loans to the bankers of the state and get 2 per cent. for it than leave it rusting in the vaults of the state treasury?

It was a good meeting and all enjoyed it, for after the rain ceased the moon came out and flooded the earth and sky in a halo of glory.

The Anthonys also served free ice cream, and it was good, while the ladies prepared ice cream that was indeed fine.

Sparr was represented by A. B. Halls, Mr. Taylor and Mrs. Allen Stevens.

Those present from Ocala besides the candidates were Henry Livingston, Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Smeak, S. T. Strunk, Thurlow Bishop.

T. E. Biggs went out in his auto, took tea with Buford Leitner, and had him as a passenger to the meeting. The question now uppermost in the minds of the other four legislative candidates is which of them will get Buford's vote.
