SHOCK NEAR SACRAMENTO

Throws a Mountain Into a River, Forming a Lake Which Threatens to Wash Away Two Towns

Sacramento, Cal., May 8.—A gigantic landslide, caused by the earthquake, has dammed up the Cape Valley gold country. The vast volume of earth falling from the mountainside has backed up the water to a depth of 100 feet, placing the surrounding territory in grave danger.

It is hoped the water will overflow gradually, but if the dam gives away there will be serious damage. The towns of Cape Rumsey and Guinda are threatened, and the inhabitants, aggregating 1000 people, are camping on the hillsides. The dam could have been blown up with dynamite at an earlier stage, but it is now too late to do this.

He Denies Sumter's Argument for the Union With Marion

Anthony, Fla., May 7, 1906.
Editor Star—I write to correct an erroneous impression seemingly prevalent among our friends of Sumter county who were joined to Marion, as they claim, to make the district democratic. And the Sumterville Times adds "it was done at the request of Marion's representative."

As Captain Pooser and myself represented this county at that time (session of 1887) I am in position to speak advisedly on the question, and I say positively it was done over my protest. I assured Mr. Willie of Jefferson county, chairman of the committee on apportionment, that Marion in all future time would be able to take care of herself, and comparing the population of this county with that of Citrus, Levy and Jefferson, who were given a senator each, with less than one-third the voters of Marion.

The ostensible purpose was what they claim, but my position that Marion county could take care of herself has been amply verified.

WHAT BUCKMAN SAYS OF WARTMANN

Jacksonville, Fla., May 3, 1906.
Editor Banner—It gives me great pleasure to see that Hon. E. L. Wartmann is a candidate from Marion county for election to the House. I cannot refrain from the wish that the people in Marion county, appreciating the valuable services rendered by this gentleman and his sterling qualities, will return him by an overwhelming vote. Mr. Wartmann was chairman of the special committee of the House to whom all proposed legislation at the last session of the legislature in relation to educational matters was referred, and before whom the bill, best known as the Buckman educational bill, was considered. It was due to that committee and especially to Mr. Wartmann as its efficient chairman, that the bill, which was a complicated piece of machinery, was not changed and that its merits were properly appreciated. But for the action of that committee, of which Mr. Wartmann was the moving spirit, I doubt that it had passed, as had the bill come to the House without the committee's endorsement of approval, or had they changed it by amendments, I do not think it would have been a law today. After the bill was returned by the committee, Mr. Wartmann was one of its chief supporters and labored untiringly in its behalf, believing as those of us who advocated the measure did, that its success means the concentration of the state's efforts and funds in the line of higher education, and rendered possible the building up of a great university and an educational system in the state, of which we could be proud, and at the same time reducing the taxes to the people for such purposes, while giving the children of our state more complete and thorough educational facilities in the common schools. LEVIED ON LEITER

Burglars Broke Into the Strong Box of the Chicago Plutocrat and Carried Off \$150,000

Chicago, May 8.—Burglars broke into the vaults in the offices of Levi S. Leiter, on Clark street, last night, and cleaned out the contents of six strong boxes. They did this by smashing the combinations on two big vaults.

A definite statement of the loss sustained has not yet been given out, but it is said that \$150,000 in negotiable securities are missing. The Pinkertons and other detectives are after the robbers.

KILLED BY A BURGLAR

Melancholy End of the Life of a Prominent Young Financier

New York, May 8.—Charles L. Spier, confidential man for H. H. Rogers, of the Standard Oil Company, and one of the most prominent young financiers in the country, was shot and killed by a burglar last night at his home on Staten Island.

Spier heard the burglar operating on the first floor of his home, and immediately attacked the man. The burglar drew his pistol and fired, killing Spier instantly. He then escaped and has not since been captured.

Desperate Deed of An Insane Mother

New York, May 8.—Mrs. Mary Waters entered the room of her home in West Seventy-sixth street, where her two daughters, Agatha and Ruth, lay sleeping last night, and shot and killed Agatha, the eldest and her favorite, and without attempting to harm Ruth, then killed herself.

Temporary insanity, due to worry over the daughter's ill health, is assigned as the reason. Mrs. Waters was the wife of John R. Waters, a well-to-do insurance broker, and was 62 years old. Agatha was 26, and Ruth is 17. The mother, who had been melancholy for a long period, had grieved over the thought that Agatha, who was her almost constant companion, expected to sail for Europe next Saturday in the hope of recovering her health.
