Cowardly Assault on Two Boardman Citizens

Mr. S. S. Boynton, of Boardman, was in town yesterday afternoon to get a warrant for the arrest of a negro who shot at him and his brother, Mr. F. P. Boynton, Saturday night.

The Boyntons were returning home Saturday night and when nearly to the gate, a little colored boy, who was following along behind, shouted to them to look out, a man was going to shoot. The men turned around and Mr. S. S. Boynton caught a dozen of the No. 6 shot in his face, while his brother was struck in the arm.

The colored boy recognized the negro who did the shooting. Mr. S. S. Boynton's face is in bad shape, the shot being deeply embedded and cannot be removed. They are all around his eyes and how he escaped without the loss of his sight is wonderful.

WORK WILL SOON BEGIN
