Sad Fate of an Aged and Blinded Baptist Minister of Santa Monica

California

Santa, Monica, Cal., March 28.-Rev. Cephas M. Baird, a retired Lutheran clergyman who had organized and built twenty-six churches since 1854, fell asleep two months ago near an open fireplace. A live coal ignited a newspaper Mr. Baird had placed over his face and he was terribly scorched. His sight was destroyed. but physicians said he would recover.

After weeks of treatment, during which the patient's condition was improving steadily. Mr. Baird, with eyes tightly bandaged, asked the physicians if he would ever see again. As gently as possible the doctor told him it could hardly be expected. Then Mr. Baird refused food, and declared that he did not wish to live without sight or hearing. He died from exhaustion and lack of nourishment. He was born June 28, 1835, near Akron, Ohio, and was well known in the East.
