A GREAT INDUSTRY IN DANGER

Resolutions Passed at a Meeting of
the Leading Cigar Manufacturers
of Tampa

(Tampa Tribune, April 7.)

At a special meeting of the cigar manufacturers of Tampa, Ybor City and West Tampa, called by Enrique Pendas, one of the leading cigar men of the city, and held last evening at the Spanish casino in Ybor City, strong resolutions were passed, calling attention of the people of Tampa and Florida as well to the conditions which will prevail in Tampa if the state goes "dry" and the menace state prohibition will prove to the cigar industry of Tampa.

For several months, in fact since the prohibition agitation first began, the people of Tampa have discussed the matters touched upon in these resolutions, their attention has been directed to the matters through the press and by public speakers, yet the official confirmation was lacking until this action, one of unanimity on the part of the manufacturers at the meeting last night, made the stand of the cigarmakers clear and voiced in no uncertain terms the results of prohibition upon the community.

The Resolutions Passed

The resolutions follow:

Whereas, There is now being agitated in the state of Florida the question of state prohibition, which we regard as the one great and serious menace to the state of Florida, particularly to the county of Hillsborough; and,

Whereas, The cigar industry of this county produces annually a product worth approximately twenty millions of dollars, which is one-third of the total products of the state, as it only produces sixty million dollars annually; and,

Whereas, The people engaged in this cigar industry, manufacturers and employees, are nearly all Spaniards, Italians and Cubans—people who are law-abiding, temperate in every respect, and who use but do not abuse the use of wines and liquors, light wines being used by the Latin race as coffee and tea is being used by the Americans; and,

Whereas, These people, having been used for generations to so use wines and liquors, and never dreamed that any effort would be made in a supposed free country to deprive them of the right of eating and drinking what they see fit, the successful consummation of which they would regard as an unwarranted invasion of their personal liberties, and would probably resent to such a degree as that we would be unable to maintain the industry here, should prohibition be enforced; and,

Whereas, We think we know the situation, and the consequent loss to the city of Tampa, the county of Hillsborough and the state of Florida, that would follow the enactment of such an unwise, unfortunate and suicidal law; therefore,
Be It Resolved, First, That we deem it our duty to call the attention of the people of this county and the state of Florida to this serious situation, as we see it;

No Threats Made

Second, That while we do not make any threats that in the event state prohibition is enacted, we will leave here, because we are citizens of Florida, and are making this state our home, and have as much loyalty for Florida as any other citizen of it, yet we feel that because of the traditions and opinions of the Latin race on this matter, that we would absolutely be unable to maintain the industry in this state, should state prohibition be enacted;

Third, That we located our industry in this state under the local option clause of the constitution of this state, which permitted the people of each county to settle this question for themselves, and the citizens who originally welcomed and aided in the location of the industry here, promised and guaranteed that our people would be permitted to live and enjoy themselves and eat and drink as they were accustomed to do in their home country, and good faith demands a compliance of the promises under which millions of dollars are now invested in this country.

Not Politics But Business Interest

Fourth, That we never interfere with the politics of this state and are content to live under any officers that the people of this state may see fit to elect, but we do demand that having left our mother country, and made our homes and invested our all in this promising state, that we should be permitted to follow the customs under which we and our ancestors have been reared;

Fifth, That we cannot too strongly call to the attention of the people of the state the serious condition that confronts them;

Sixth, That copies of these resolutions be furnished the Associated Press of the state generally.



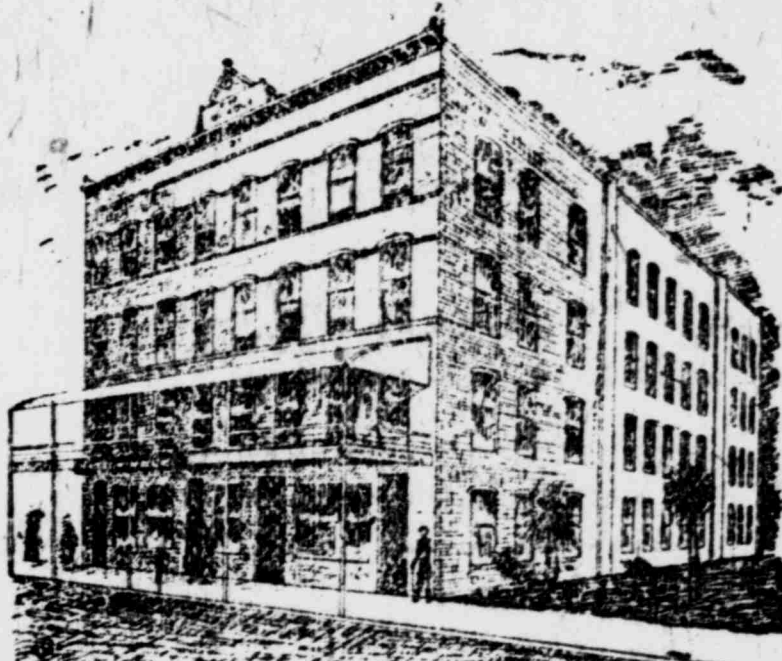
