Miss Perrin was an intimate friend of Mrs. Gillette, mother of the young murderer, who is a resident of Zion City. Miss Perrin had talked of little else but the crime since her return from her unsuccessful mission. Yesterday she walked to the lake, leaped in and was drowned.

ATTACKED BY A SHARK

Narrow Escape of a Young Man While In Bathing Off Cocoa Beach

The Georgiana correspondent sends the Titusville Advocate the following account of a young man's narrow escape from death while in the surf at Cocoa Beach:

"At Cocoa Beach, Sunday morning, several were bathing, when young LaRoche screamed that he was shark bit. The others thought he was 'just funning.' But the next dive the monster made at the boy it threw its tail out of the water, and then the horror of the situation dawned upon them. It tore a long gash on the inside of his thigh, bit off the calf of one leg, and one heel, and two more bites not quite so serious—five bites in all. The wounded boy was helped to shore and brought across to Georgiana, where Dr. Chambers did all he could to relieve his sufferings, and afterwards taken to Cocoa for Dr. Hughlett to perform the surgical operation necessary. The size of the shark was estimated to be between 12 and 20 feet in length. It is the first time that the bathers on that beach have ever been molested by these monsters of the mighty deep."

MAKING AN EFFORT TO REPLANT BUFFALOES

The history of American buffaloes presents a powerful argument in favor of the conservation of our natural resources. Fifty years ago there were thousands of the animals on the plains of the West. Today there are known to be something less than 600 of the animals in the United States and Canada. The herds were decimated by ruthless slaughter until the breed became almost extinct. The Canadian government is now trying to repair, in a measure, the awful waste of years ago. It has isolated a herd of 400 buffaloes in Alberta, which it is carefully watching and feeding. The herd came through last winter in fair shape, and will probably be increased by 25 per cent. before the next winter sets in. In the course of a few years the Canadian government hopes to be able to turn loose 1,000 buffaloes on the plains, which it will then protect by drastic laws.—Ex.
