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BOARD OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION

Ocala, Florida, Oct. 6, 1908.

The Board of Public Instruction in and for Marion county, Florida, met this the sixth day of October, 1908, in regular session with Isaac Stevens, chairman; B. R. Blitch, and J. S. Grantham present.

Minutes of last meeting were read and approved. The Churchill school was granted stove and piping and material for repair.

The Dallas school was granted \$10 more on addition to house. The colored people in a neighborhood about three miles west of Belleview again made application for the establishment of a new school, claiming that they had fifty scholars and would furnish house and furniture if the county will furnish teacher. The superintendent was instructed to investigate and find out if the patrons are permanent settlers or only transient people, and to act as he thinks best.

The colored people at Cedar Landing, five miles from Orange Springs, applied for a new school and the superintendent was instructed to investigate the conditions and act as he thinks best.

The trustees of the Linadale school house were authorized to sell the old East Linadale school house to the best advantage.

The patrons of the Andalusia school protested against Mr. Burleson from sending to the Citra school as it took his children away and lowered the average of the Andalusia school. The secretary was instructed to notify Mr. Burleson that he had no right to send to the Citra school, without getting a permit from the board.

The Andalusia school was granted some apparatus and school supplies. Dr. H. C. Morrison applied to the board asking that the board pay the full amount of \$25 to carry the children from Mayville to Weirsdale.

Mrs. Simpson applied to the board, and asked that the board be requested to come by her house and carry in the wagon, her daughter to school.

After considering both requests and studying the distances the board instructed the secretary to write Mr. Morrison and request him to go by Mrs. Simpson's and get her daughter and the board would pay the full \$25 per month for six months.

The secretary is also requested to notify the teacher at Weirsdale to get all children who come in the wagon out one half hour earlier than the other children.

Mr. J. A. Hicks, supervisor of the Key Pond school, tendered his resignation. The same was accepted and Mr. W. T. Henderson was appointed to fill the unexpired term.

In view of the fact that all appropriations for new buildings, the salaries of teachers, and the operations of schools have been exhausted by appropriations, that the board will not grant any further money for new buildings, nor establish any new schools nor raise the salaries of any more teachers, nor pay for conveying any other children, than have already been provided for.

The superintendent was instructed to notify Mr. E. Weaver, that if Mr. James Badger wishes to send to school in the school wagon, that the wagon must go to where the Martin and Blitchton road crosses the Old Town road, to get Mr. Badger's children. Also to write Mr. Badger that he desires to send in the school wagon to notify Mr. Weaver when he will start and Mr. Weaver will come to the crossing of the above named roads.

The board adjourned to meet on Wednesday morning at 8 o'clock. On Wednesday morning, the board met per adjournment with the secretary and full board present.

The board paid a visit to the Ocala High School and also to the new Primary School. It found the Ocala High School with a large enrollment and crowded, but in a very flourishing and prosperous condition.

It found the new primary building lacking about four weeks of being completed, but being erected in a good location, the best preparation for now being used in the old building and decided, that while they would like very much to equip the new building with new seats and furniture, that for this year they would have to get along with most of the old furniture.

The board agreed to pay one half on 40 desks for the High School, three tables, three chairs and four stoves.

The board then visited Howard Academy and found it in good condition and endorsed their movement for industrial work.
