RETURNS ARE ALL IN

Taft Will Have at Least 309 Votes. Democrats Seem to Have Elected Governors of Ohio and Indiana.

New York Nov. 5.—Practically complete returns received up to a late hour last night indicate that Wm. H. Taft, of Ohio, as president-elect, will have a vote of 309 in the electoral college. This is within sixteen votes of the forecast made by National Chairman Frank H. Hitchcock and sixty-seven more than a majority out of the total electoral vote of 483.

The most important news of the late returns indicate that Maryland, after vacillating during the day and apparently being safe for the democracy, has been swung into the Taft column. The unofficial figures give Mr. Taft the state by 136 votes. Maryland was the last of the doubtful states to be heard from.

Indiana and West Virginia, as well as Montana, turned out to be safely republican. Colorado went for Bryan.

Mr. Bryan has a total of 174 votes, two less than he received in 1896. In 1904 Mr. Parker received only 140 votes, in 1900 Mr. Bryan received 155 votes, and in 1896 the Nebraskan received 176 votes.

Mr. Taft's 309 electoral votes, compared with 336 received by Roosevelt in 1904, 292 received by McKinley in 1900, and 271 received by McKinley in 1896.

No changes of material interest have been received in the congressional returns. The republicans will have about the same working majority in the next congress as at present and Joseph G. Cannon of Illinois, undoubtedly will succeed himself as speaker. Representative Jesse Overstreet of Indiana, and Hephurn of Iowa are the most conspicuous among those who have failed of re-election.

The senate retains its republican complexion, although there will be a material change in the personnel of the upper body of the national legislature.

National Chairman Norman E. Mack of the democratic party has issued a statement in which he declared he did not believe Mr. Bryan would again be a candidate for the presidency. He said that he believed that the Nebraskan might be a candidate for the United States senate in 1911, provided the legislature of his state is democratic in that year, when the first vacancy will occur.

The latest returns indicate that in the national house of representatives the republicans will have 208 members and the democrats 172, with eleven districts missing.

Judge Taft's plurality in the state of New York, according to corrected returns late last night, is 205,495, more than 28,000 in excess of President Roosevelt's plurality of four years ago, Gov. Charles E. Hughes was re-elected in New York state by 71,159.

The heavy vote in Ohio made figures extraordinarily low owing to the immense size of the ballot. Mr. Taft carried his own state, however, by 50,000 plurality, a reduction of more than 200,000 from the Roosevelt vote of four years ago. The democratic state ticket in Ohio, headed by Judson Harmon for governor, appears to be safely elected. The state legislature, which is to choose a successor to Senator Foraker, appears to be in doubt as between the republicans and democrats.

In Indiana, Mr. Taft was successful in carrying the state by about 8,000, but the entire democratic state ticket, headed by M. R. Marshall for governor was elected. The congressional delegation from the state shows a gain of seven democrats.

The returns from West Virginia, owing to the mountainous character of the country, are slow in coming in. A sufficient number of counties and districts have been heard from, however, to show that Mr. Taft has a safe plurality.

Colorado early in the day shifted from the doubtful column to the Bryan list. The legislature, which is to choose a successor to Senator Teller, also is apparently democratic.

Mr. Bryan's victory in his home state of Nebraska was a sweeping one. Five of Nebraska's six congressmen will be democrats, while in the legislature only eighteen republicans seem to be elected out of a total of 112 senators and representatives.

An eleventh hour development was the placing of Missouri, which had been in the Bryan column, on the doubtful list.

MUST HAVE BEEN CRAZY

A New York Broker Killed His Mother and Himself

New York, Nov. 5.—Mrs. E. Velt and her son, J. Nelson Velt, a Wall street broker, were found dead in their rooms in a large apartment hotel on upper Broadway yesterday.

The mother had been shot in the head, and her body was in her bedroom while the son was lying suffocated by gas, on the floor of the bathroom, with a pillow under his head. The door to the bathroom was locked, which was held as evidence of probable suicide on his part, following the death of his mother, possibly at his hands.
