SENATE GETS A SETBACK

Mr. Roosevelt Informs It that Certain of His Executive Actions are None of Its Business

Washington, D. C., Jan. 8.—President Roosevelt yesterday informed the senate in no uncertain terms that he had given his approval to the absorption of the Tennessee Coal and Iron Company by the United States Steel corporation and that he had instructed Attorney General Bonaparte not to respond to the senate inquiry as to the reasons for his failure to prosecute the steel company.

The president concludes his message with the statement that he does not conceive it "to be within the authority of the senate to give directions of this character to the head of an executive department."

The message to the senate is in response to a resolution introduced by Senator Culberson, calling on the Attorney General to state whether he had brought an action against the steel company because of its acquisition of the Tennessee concern, and if not, the reason for non-action.

A DEADLOCK IN ILLINOIS

Over the Election of Governor is Deferring the Inauguration of Deneen

Springfield, Ill., Jan. 8.—The inauguration of Charles S. Deneen as governor of Illinois, was indefinitely postponed yesterday when the house and general assembly got into a deadlock over the proposition of the democrats to contest the governor's election. The senate refused at noon to go into joint session to canvass the vote in the last election. No legislation is possible until the vote has been canvassed.

ACQUITTAL OF MRS. ERB

And Her Sister, Mrs. Biesel, of the Murder of the Former's Husband. Another Famous Trial Ended

Media, Pa., Jan. 8.—The jury returned a verdict of not guilty in the trial of Mrs. J. Clayton Erb and her sister, Mrs. Catherine Biesel, charged jointly with the murder of Capt. J. Clayton Erb, a prominent Philadelphia politician. The killing of Capt. Erb occurred in October last, at Red Gables, the country home of the couple, near Philadelphia. The jury reached a decision after an all-night session, in which there were many wranglings and frequent instructions.

PROHIBITION FOR FLORIDA—PERHAPS

At the next session of the Florida legislature a bill will be introduced for the amendment of the state constitution so as to submit the matter of state wide prohibition to the people, and one of the warmest advocates that this bill will have will be the Hon. Don C. McMullen, senator from Tampa.

Mr. McMullen stated yesterday that while he will not frame this bill he is certain that it will be introduced and he has no doubt but that it will carry. It will require a two-thirds vote to pass such a measure, but from the line up, which it is alleged has been formed, there is little doubt but that the required majority will be secured. Mr. McMullen says he will lend his effort on the floor to the passage of the bill and will also aid in bringing about state wide prohibition, even if he has to go on the stump.

Under the present conditions it will be impossible to have prohibition in Florida for two years to come. No election can be held under the law, until the next general election, two years hence, at which time the matter of state wide prohibition will be submitted to the people. If the vote favors state wide prohibition the bill can become effective January 1, 1911.

Mr. McMullen has framed but one bill so far that he will introduce in the senate, this being the bank guarantee deposit bill, which has been so much discussed throughout the state. It is understood that much opposition has developed to this measure, but a stubborn fight will be made by those who favor it. The legislature meets in April, and there are many matters of importance to south Florida to come up at this time.—Tampa Tribune.

MURDER MYSTERY IN MICHIGAN

Dismembered and Charred Remains of a Preacher Found in the Stoves of His Church

Detroit, Mich., Jan. 8.—The dismembered body of Rev. John J. Carmichael, a Methodist minister, was found yesterday partially consumed in the church near Columbus, in the southwestern part of St. Clair county.

Myron Brown, who lives near the scene of the tragedy, was the first to discover the crime. While he was waiting at the cross roads to keep an appointment the cold wind drove him to seek shelter in the church. He was surprised to find the church doors unlocked and upon opening them, was terrified to see the church floor, the pews and even the communion table thick with blood and fragments of bloody clothing scattered all around. Evidently the clergyman, who was 56 years old and of athletic build, had made a terrific struggle for his life.

The authorities, on their arrival at the church, found parts of the dismembered body in the two stoves located at the front and rear, and discovered in one stove the head of what was apparently a new hatchet, the handle of which had been burned off.

A dirk was also found in the church and it is believed that the dirk served for the murder while the hatchet was used to cut the body to pieces.

The minister's horse was found today tied to a tree in the village of Pine River, the dead man's overcoat being discovered in the buggy.

Pine River is a small village near Thornton on the main line of the Grand Trunk railroad, and only 20 miles from the scene of the murder.
