THE SUNNY JIM SPECIAL

The Sunny Jim Special left the passenger station on the Coast Line at 6:40 this morning, promptly on time with about 20 passengers, mostly traveling men, and an immense lot of baggage. "Sunny Jim" had his huge sign across the rear of the tail coach that even those who ran to catch the train might read and learn all about it. The train was made up of baggage car, first and second class day coaches and a good engine. All it lacks now is a combination mail and express car, with a mail clerk and express messenger. Every passenger was given a pretty silk badge by Mr. Robinson, on which was printed in two colors, "A. C. L. railway, Sunny Jim Special, Ocala to Lakeland; Initial Trip June 28th, 1920." Mrs. M. E. Robinson accompanied her husband to Tampa on the first trip of this long cherished train. Mr. Robert Taylor, one of the officials of the road, was also aboard. The engineer is Mr. Trammel, of Lakeland and the conductor, Captain George Bussard, both of whom will probably move to Ocala. Mr. Trammel is the inventor and has several patents on railway car and engine improvements, which will eventually make his fortune. Mr. Robinson was looking for the "Ocala editor" to "pin a rose" badge on him, but he was not in evidence. Mr. M. E. Robinson, or "Sunny Jim," should feel a just pride in the inauguration of this new train. It is the fruition of an idea of several years standing and a labor of two years or more with petitions and personal efforts among the railroad men and patrons. The train will connect at Lakeland for Tampa and will reach Ocala on the return a little after 10 o'clock each night.


