Pretty Beads Made of Salt.

To make salt beads, heat two handfuls of common salt as hot as the hands will stand. Warm one cupful of cornstarch, and mix with the salt. Take one cupful of hot water and color it any desired shade with water colors, and use to form a paste with the salt and corn starch.

Mold with the hands into the sized bead required, and have a large cushion ready, so that when a large pin is stuck through each bead the pin can be at once stuck into the cushion. One can make beads all of the same size or graduate the sizes, threading the large ones in the middle of the string, and smaller ones at the ends, or groups of large beads can be separated by smaller ones.

What Ailed the Senate.
