

SPECIAL MEETING BOARD PUBLIC INSTRUCTION

Be it remembered that at a special meeting duly called and held by the Board of Public Instruction of the county of Marion in the state of Florida, on the 28th day of December A. D., 1914, the following members were present: W. D. Carn, chairman, B. R. Blitch, member absent, J. S. Grantham.

At which meeting the following proceeds were had relating to the issuance of funding warrants:

Mr. B. R. Blitch proposed the adoption of the following resolution: was seconded by Mr. Carn and the motion being then and there put to a vote of the "ayes" and "nays" and the roll being called, said resolutions were unanimously adopted by the vote of all the members present voting "aye." The resolutions are in words and figures as follows, to wit:

Resolution providing for the issuance of Fifteen Thousand Dollars funding school warrants of the county of Marion, state of Florida, Board of Public Instruction.

Whereas, there are now outstanding and unpaid the valid school warrants drawn upon the treasurer of Marion county by the Board of Public Instruction, aggregating the principal sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000) and with interest now due thereon amounts to a sum in excess of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) and

Whereas, there are now no available funds in the school fund in the treasury of the county to pay the same or any part thereof, and it is desirable to make provision therefor:

It is therefore now resolved and ordered by the Board of Public Instruction of the county of Marion, state of Florida, that there be and there are hereby ordered issued the obligations of the Board of Public Instruction of said county, to be evidenced by fifteen (15) principal warrants drawn upon the treasurer of said county, in the aggregate amount of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000) pursuant to authority given by law to boards of public instruction, particularly as authorized by Chapter 5390 of the Acts of the Legislature of Florida at its session in 1905, entitled, "An Act authorizing the county boards of public instruction to borrow money for the payment of school warrants when there are no funds in the treasury for such purposes and to pay interest on such loans not to exceed eight per centum (8%) per annum," approved June, 1905; which warrants when issued shall be fifteen (15) in number, numbered from one to fifteen (1 to 15) of the denomination of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) each, besides semi-annual interest warrants to be attached. Said warrants shall be each dated January 2nd, A. D., 1915 and shall become payable at the office of the county treasurer in the city of Ocala, Florida, or at the option of the respective holders, at the banking house of the Continental and Commercial Trust and Savings Bank, Chicago, Illinois, which principal warrants shall become due \$1,000 January, 1917; \$1,000 January 1, 1918; \$1,000 January 1, 1919; \$1,000 January 1, 1920; \$1,000 January 1, 1921; \$1,000 January 1, 1922; \$1,000 January 1, 1923; \$1,000 January 1, 1924; \$1,000 January 1, 1925; \$1,000 January 1, 1926; \$1,000 January 1, 1927; \$1,000 January 1, 1928; \$1,000 January 1, 1929; \$1,000 January 1, 1930; \$1,000 January 1, 1931.

Said principal warrants shall each bear interest at the rate of six per cent. (6%) per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of January and of July in each year, from their date of issuance until the principal thereof shall be paid, which interest payments shall be represented by separate warrants, and all of said principal and interest warrants shall be payable upon presentation and surrender of the same in the order in which they become due and payable. Said principal and interest warrants shall become payable by the county treasurer upon their presentation and surrender to him as they respectively fall due, and with necessary variations to indicate their respective maturities, numbers, etc., shall be in substantially the words and figures attached to the following certificate, to-wit:

Know all men by these presents, That the Board of Public Instruction of the County of Marion, in the state of Florida, acknowledges itself to owe and for value received, hereby promises to pay bearer, on the first day of January, A. D. 19—, the sum of ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS in lawful money of the United States of America, with interest thereon at the rate of six per centum. (6%) per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of January and of July, in each year, from the date hereof until the

principal hereof is paid, upon presentation and surrender of the principal and interest warrants hereto attached as they severally become due. Said principal and interest warrants may be presented for registration to the county treasurer, but shall not be subject to registration until within thirty (30) days of the time said warrants, respectively, fall due, as above provided. The warrants representing the principal and interest hereto attached are each payable at the office of the county treasurer of Marion county, state of Florida, in the city of Ocala, Florida, or, at the option of the respective holders, at the banking house of the Continental and Commercial Trust and Savings Bank, Chicago, Illinois.

Each of the principal warrants hereto attached is issued by the Board of Public Instruction of said county to borrow money to pay valid outstanding school warrants of said county, equal in amount to said principal warrants hereto attached, by virtue and in strict compliance with the requirements of law, particularly Chapter 5390 of the General Statutes of the State of Florida of 1905, entitled "An Act authorizing the county boards of public instruction to borrow money for the payment of school warrants when there are no funds in the treasury for such purpose, and to pay interest on such loans not exceeding eight per centum (8%) per annum," approved June 1, 1905; and pursuant to resolutions of the Board of Public Instruction of said county, duly authorizing and directing the issuance of said funding warrants, all of which have been done in all respects in full and strict compliance with the requirements of the constitution and laws of Florida.

It is hereby certified and recited, that all conditions precedent to the lawful issuance of the principal and interest warrants hereto attached required by law to exist, happen and be performed, do exist and have happened and been in all respects duly performed; that the total indebtedness of said Board of Public Instruction, including the funding warrants hereto attached and the series of warrants of which said warrants are a part, does not exceed any constitutional or statutory limitation, and that for the prompt payment of the principal thereof, the full faith, credit and resources of said county Board of Public Instruction have been and are hereby irrevocably pledged.

In witness whereof, The Board of Public Instruction of the county of Marion, in the state of Florida, has caused these presents to be sealed with the seal of said Board of Public Instruction, to be signed by its chairman and counter signed by its secretary, as well as the warrants hereto attached likewise executed, this second day of January A. D., 1915.

Be it further resolved and ordered, that in order to make provision for the prompt payment of the principal and interest of the indebtedness incurred for the purpose of paying the outstanding warrants aforesaid, the Board of Public Instruction of said county of Marion does hereby irrevocably pledge itself to cause to be levied an annual tax (not, however, to exceed seven (7) mills on the dollar, annually) on the assessed valuation of the property of said county, and to use all other resources lawfully available to the Board of Public Instruction in order to make proper provision for the prompt payment of the principal and interest of the above described warrants.

The outstanding warrants that are to be funded and paid by the issuance of the warrants above provided for, are numbered, dated and payable to the persons as follows:
