WELCH SELLING THE LUMBER

David S. Welch is doing a fine business with his lumber and mill work and general building material establishment in North Ocala. Mr. Welch's plant shipped the material to Kendrick yesterday for a nice new house, complete, for Mr. Bent.

The day before the material was shipped to Fruitland Park for a complete bungalow of nice size and attractive design for Mrs. Katherine Smith.

Material was sold yesterday for Mr. Troy Hall of Summerfield for an addition to his home there.

Six carloads of materials go each week to Howey, in Lake county, where so much building is going on and where Mr. Welch, by square dealing and selling good goods at a close figure, is practically getting all of the business.

A good deal of stuff goes to Brooksville, where the plant is supplying everything for the new home of the Hernandez State Bank.

The big library job which has just been completed, was supplied by Mr. Welch's mill, and he was doing most of the mill work and supplying much of the material for the union station, work on which is now suspended.

Mr. Welch is very much pleased with his present system of delivery. He has two automobile trucks with long trailers attached and can deliver with these, in one-half the time, more lumber than he could formerly haul all day with several teams. He would not go back to the horse delivery under any circumstances.

WILLARD DOES A GOOD TURN

Mr. C. W. Willard of Weirsdale and Westerly, R. I., who owns half a block of land near the new high school building, on which has been located four negro cottages in the midst of an otherwise solid white section, is improving his property. Two of the cottages have been moved back on the block and are being fitted up for white families. They will be celled inside with patent board, painted outside and nice windows, doors and fireplaces put in.
