OCALA'S ADVANTAGES AND ATTRACTIONS

(Statesboro, Ga., Eagle)

It was the privilege of the editor of the Eagle to pay a visit to Ocala, Florida, one day during the past week.

This is the place that our old neighbor, the Honorable R. Simmons, has cast his lot.

He has acquired considerable farming lands and is buying more. Mr. Simmons has one of the prettiest homes on the prettiest street of that city.

We were given an opportunity to inspect what they have in the way of farming lands around Ocala. Their lands are equal to Bulloch county's best. And that is saying a great deal. The feature that struck us was the difference in prices. Good farms can be bought around Ocala at less than half what the same values can be obtained in Bulloch county.

Mr. Simmons showed us a tract of 460 acres, with 240 acres in cultivation. The property is located three miles from town, on the line of the railroad, with a spur track alongside of it. He bought the land last spring, rented it out on shares and had already received enough money from his shares to pay all expenses and pay for the purchase of the land and had \$1000 left. There were other men who had made a greater record than this.

Thirty dollars per acre gets fancy lands near in, with fine improvements. Lots of land further out is selling for \$10 per acre and some of it for less. There is not a waste acre on any of it. There are no branches or creeks. No wet, sobby places. No swamps. Plenty of rich hammock soil that will grow fifty bushels of corn to the acre or a bale of cotton without fertilization. The lakes furnish the water.

The country roads are paved with the sand lime subsoil and are almost perfect. All they need in that country is people. The best place we have ever seen for a poor man to go and get him a home and start out in life.

You can raise anything in and around Ocala that you can raise in Bulloch county and do it fifty per cent cheaper. Then you can raise a lot of things you can't raise here.

The finest live stock country we have ever seen. Saw one 15-month-old calf that tipped the scales at 1400 pounds. They were fixing to ship him to the Chicago Live Stock Exhibition. More fat hogs than we have seen in many a day. It struck us that they ought to have our packing plant.

The finest climate on earth. A little frost, but no freezes. Good churches and good schools, big trunk lines of railroads, on the main line between New York and Tampa. Splendid shipping facilities for crops that will grow the year around.

They had a cannery running, canning snap beans; they were shipping them by the carload to Chicago. They were growing luxuriantly in the fields then.

Marion county will ship 30,000 boxes of oranges this season, though this is not the real orange belt.

Just why the values up here are so much higher than they are down there we are at a loss to know. The
