Subscriptions still pour in freely. We have received fifteen new cash subscribers this week without solicitation. The Union is growing unpopular daily.

Court adjourned Thursday afternoon, after having disposed of quite a large amount of business. The important office of Judge of this district could not well be filled any more ably than it is at present by Judge Horton. May the judicial robes ever fall upon such shoulders.

We were pleased this week to receive a call from Messrs. R. P. West and E. D. Neely, prominent citizens of Washington county. They live upon the Republican and report excellent crops over there. There is an immense emigration passing into that valley, and it is destined to become a power in Northwestern Kansas.

Our position in our remarks the other evening upon the Universal Suffrage question, did not exactly suit some of our friends. How any intelligent, whole souled man can ask that he shall have the advantage over any other man in a Republican form of government, is more than we can comprehend.

COULD NOT STAND IT.—A German friend of ours who is urging us to come out boldly on the Universal Suffrage question, and blames us for not throwing the whole influence of our paper against A. Johnson's administration, informs us that he sent a copy of the Enterprise to some of his friends in St. Louis recently, and they sent the paper back, saying they had no use for a paper of that tone in free Missouri.

It is reported in town that our "Red Brethren" are again burning, shooting and scalping the barbarous whites up the road. A fight took place at Alkali, between Julesburg and Denver, in which sixteen of the "brethren" and four white barbarians were killed. Those who killed the poor innocent red men should be summoned before the "Committee on the Conduct of the War," and either severely reprimanded or incarcerated.

What is the reason that the school-house question is allowed to die out? Are we going to give it up? Let us all put the shoulder to the wheel and shove the matter along. We should by all means have the rock quarried and hauled upon the ground, and the door and window caps and sills cut out this winter. Then, in April next the masons can commence work, and the autumn season find us with a good school-house.

The Grand Jury made sad havoc among the liquor sellers this week. About six were bled to the amount of twenty dollars and costs.—Some of them were parties who had sold liquor some time ago, but who had become disgusted with the business and quit. It was no fault of the liquor sellers that they were fined for selling without license, for they had, most of them at least, applied to the County Board for a license but were refused.

Several freight wagons have loaded with sorghum molasses manufactured in this county for the market west of here. This is a good thing for our farmers, and is destined to become an important trade. We do not believe there is any country laying out of doors that can rival this in cane raising. A good cooper would do well here at Marysville, as he could scarcely make enough barrels in a year to supply the demand every Fall, to say nothing about the other work in that line that there is to be done.

It being the duty, under the law, of the Grand Jury to visit the County Jail and make such orders and suggestions as seem necessary for the security and comfort of prisoners, that body visited our County Jail this week and recommended or instructed the Commissioners to purchase a new iron cell and put therein. The cell is a new invention that is coming into general use, and that it is impossible to escape from. One thousand dollars is the price of the cell.
