Packing Eggs.

Fine-cut straw or hay and clean oats are good materials for packing eggs, but chaff should never be used. The packing should be perfectly sweet and dry, as musty and damp material will impart a bad flavor to the eggs that go long distances.

Place two or three inches of the material at the bottom of the package, then a layer of eggs with the ends toward the side of the package, but not touching the sides by an inch or more. When the course is completed, put on several inches of packing, well shaken and whisked about till all the interstices between the eggs are filled; press down gently with a follower; remove all but an inch in depth of the packing, and put in another layer of eggs in the same way as the first, taking care that the packing is pressed between the ends of the eggs and the side of the package.
