THE Solomon Sentinel of last week notwithstanding Glick's big meeting in that place, says: Dickinson county will give Blaine and Logan 1,500 majority, and Martin for Governor 1,000 majority.

JOHN GUTHRIE, honest old John, was nominated for Judge of the District Court in the District of which Shawnee county is an important factor. We are all for Guthrie up this way, as we were once for him for Governor. He is a true and reliable man.

THE New York Times, opponent of Blaine, says: "The statement which Mr. Blaine makes in his letter to Mr. William Walter Phelps should close all lips upon a subject which has been introduced and discussed in this campaign only where manliness was forgotten."

Gov. BATE, of Tennessee, who is a candidate for re-election, in a recent speech informed his audience that "when he forgot his fealty to the Confederate cause he hoped that he might be buried with his face toward Ireland and his back toward heaven forever."

CLEVELAND was elected Governor of New York by an overwhelming majority, but the actual number of votes he received was only 807 more than New York gave General Hancock when a candidate for the Presidency, and Hancock was defeated by a handsome majority.

THE Republican party has legislated in the interest of the farmer as well as of the manufacturer. It passed the homestead bill, which was approved by its first President, Abraham Lincoln. The Democratic party, opposed this measure and its last President James Buchanan, vetoed it.

ST. JOHN is not quite so hard on liquor drinkers as Hendricks once was. In his speech recorded on page 31, Congressional Globe, first session of the Fortieth Congress, upon the "bill to prevent the bringing of any spirituous or malt liquor into the Capitol," Hendricks said: "I am perfectly willing to vote for this or any other bill short of putting to death a man who shall take a drink of liquor."

THERE is a fair show of Nicholas Ford's election as Governor in Missouri. He has against him a man whose only record is that he was a Rebel General. Marmaduke was nominated as a concession to the Rebellion of Missouri. But the world has moved politically in late years very fast, and with it slow-plodding old Missouri. The people of that State begin to want men for office other than those with Rebel records. As in Virginia so it is beginning to be in Missouri: people are tired of the "solid South" business.

THE folks who were present at the Opera House the night before the election in 1882 will remember that it was the best show of the season. And everybody will be glad to know that the Hon. Joseph G. Waters, the orator on that occasion, will close an extensive canvass of the State at our Opera House Monday night, the 24th of November. He travels under the auspices of the only union party, broad shown in the better Republican organization—the Realization Republican State Committee.—American City Union.
