THE MOHAWK.

Transport on Which Lieut. Conger Returned.

Brought Co. B. Home From Cuba-- It Has Been Remodeled.

Lieutenant A. L. Conger returned to San Francisco from the Philippines on board the Grant on which he was the ranking officer.

This is the largest vessel that ever entered the Golden Gate, and is the finest transport afloat. She was originally the transport Mohawk, the one that brought the Eighth Regiment from Cuba. It was fitted up at an expense of \$150,000. She is built of steel, with double steel bottom; four continuous decks, one smoke stack and four masts. Its original cost was \$1,250,000. She is provided with twin screws, three double ended Scotch boilers and triple-expansion engines of 48 inch stroke, capable of driving her 14 knots an hour. She is 455 feet long, 49 feet beam, 40 feet depth from upper deck, with a gross tonnage of 5750 and a load displacement of 12,000 tons. She weighs about 50,000 tons.

TWO WOUNDS.

Akron Soldier In the Hospital at Manila.

He Believes the Campaign in the Philippines Is About Ended.

Peter Loy of this city, who enlisted in the regular army at the outbreak of the war in the Philippines, is in a hospital at Manila, suffering from two wounds received in the battles with the natives.

He had written an interesting letter to Albert Buehrle, telling of the affairs in and around Manila. It follows:

MANILA, PHILIPPINE ISLANDS, OF LEYON, Eighth Army Corps, April 2, 1899.

Friend Al--

"As I have considerable leisure time, I thought I would write you a few lines, hoping they will find you all well. At present I am in the Second Reserve hospital, from a wound in my left leg, and one in the forehead. Neither is serious. The bullet entered the left leg on the left side just below the knee, coming out on opposite side. The wound in head was grazed.

"Now my fighting will be over for six weeks at least, but if no fever sets in I may get out sooner. All the hospitals are crowded with sick and wounded. Sixty entered in the last few days. There has been some hot work here the past few days. Our lines are almost to the Capitol now. I think the fight is almost over. The weather is very hot and sultry, and there is considerable rain. We do not know just how many men we lost yet. I think you get the details quicker than we do, as they are fighting in different places. The money is two for one. Our American dollar is worth two Spanish dollars, and everything is going up. Our first 10 days' fight we did not have one good meal.
