

DIED ON THE GOLD TRAIL.

Many Perished on the Edmonton Route. Others Hungry and Sick.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., June 6.—J. F. Storey of Ontario, passenger on the steamer Dingo, with three others started for Dawson about 17 months ago over the Edmonton route. Between Peace river and Nelson the country is almost one continuation of swamps and sloughs. For weeks he and his companions slept in clothes and blankets saturated with water. The 21 head of horses with which they started died and they were compelled to retrace their steps. At Akred river they found 30 men suffering from frost bites and scurvy. At every camp they found sickness and distress, for about six weeks they lived on rabbits which they snared.

On reaching Telegraph creek, Storey reported the situation to the magistrate, who at once started in a relief expedition. He said the number of people who have perished on the trail will never be known.

MESSAGE PROBABLY FROM ANDREE.

Boys Found a Slip of Paper on Coast of Iceland.

CHRISTIANIA, June 6.—According to a dispatch from Mandal, the most southern town of Norway, two boys, on May 14 last, found on the north coast of Iceland a small cork case containing a slip of paper, dated July 11, 1897, signed "Andree, Strindberg and Fraenkel," and bearing the words "All well." Thrown out about longitude 81, latitude unknown.

Prof. Andree's brother thought the case was probably one of the letter boys with which the Andree expedition was provided.

Banks Closed Due to Shortage.

HANOVER, N. H., June 6.—The Cocheo Savings bank of this city was closed from paying out or receiving money and a warrant was issued for the arrest of Harry Hough, the treasurer, who is charged with a shortage of \$8,500. The Cocheo National bank also closed its doors and National Bank Examiner Carrell was expected to take charge of the national bank at once. Hough, besides being treasurer of the savings institution, was paying teller of the national bank.

Mothers' Congress Selected Des Moines.

PHILADELPHIA, June 6.—The officers and executive board of the National Congress of Mothers decided upon Des Moines, May 23, 1900, as the place and time for the next congress.

LOUBET ACTS PROMPTLY.

Moves Made Against Men in High Places Owing to Their Hostility After Mercier.

PARIS, June 6.—An order of the day was accepted by the government stigmatizing the occurrences at Anteuil and approving the demonstrations of the government. It was carried without a division, after the first part had been adopted by a vote of 513 to 82, and the second part had been voted by 326 to 175.

The chamber, by 299 to 238 votes decided to adjourn the appointment of a commission of inquiry into the conduct of General Mercier, the former minister of war, in the Dreyfus matter, until after the court-martial at Rennes, which is to try Dreyfus as a result of the decision of the court of cassation.

The ministers met, President Loubet in the chair, and decided to remove the advocate general, M. Loubet, and the minister of justice, M. Lebre, was directed to begin proceedings against M. Tardif, president of the assizes court, before the council of magistracy for the way in which they conducted the case against MM. Deroalde and Marcel-Habart, who were acquitted Wednesday last of the charge of instigating to insubordination at the time of the election of President Loubet.

The minister of war, M. Krantz, ordered proceedings to be taken against Esterhazy for obtaining and using documents connected with the so-called "secret dossier," and the minister also issued instructions that proceedings be taken against General Pellissier in the manner in which he conducted the Esterhazy case.

The prefect of police, M. Blanc, ordered the closure of the Automobile Club de France, at which Comte de Dion, who was one of the ringleaders at Anteuil, is president. A police commissary thereupon proceeded to the club's premises, on the Place de la Concorde, and cleared the members out, after which he affixed seals to the doors. Vigorous measures were taken to suppress demonstrations. Mounted detachments of republican guards were stationed at some sections.

Denied Anna Gould Led Procession.

PARIS, June 6.—Count Boni de Castellane wrote a letter to The Echo de Paris denying the statement of newspapers that the countess (formerly Miss Anna Gould of New York) placed herself at the head of the Jeunesse Royaliste at the Anteuil demonstration. The count declared his wife did not belong to the clubs and that she did not leave her seat, from which she could not even see what was occurring.

Puddlers Given a Raise.

HOLLIDAYSBURG, Pa., June 6.—The puddlers in the employ of the American Steel and Wire company at Duncansville, this county, formerly the Duncansville iron works, were given a 10 per cent increase in their wages and also assurances of "steady work."

General Alger in Canada.

MONTREAL, June 6.—General Russell A. Alger, Mrs. Alger and party passed through this city on their way to Grand Mere, where General Alger's son resides.
