

**Wheeling Car Strike Ended.**  
WHEELING, June 30.—The strike of the motormen and conductors of the Wheeling Railway company came to an end when an agreement was entered into by the company and strikers, to the following effect: No employee to be discharged except for cause, and the discharged employee or a committee of the men will be given opportunity to disapprove any charges leading to his discharge; 11 hours shall be a day's work; the company will pay 18 cents per hour; the company agrees to take back the strikers and also will retain its present non-union employees.

MORNINGTON, W. Va., June 30.—A terrific storm visited this section and dozens of houses were unroofed. The wind blew like a hurricane. A rainfall of several inches accompanied the storm.
