An Ordinance

Of the Council of the city of Akron, Ohio, to construct a main trunk in sewer district No. nine (9).

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Council of the city of Akron, Ohio, two-thirds of all the members elected thereto concurring, that the construction of a main trunk sewer in sewer district No. nine (9), in the city of Akron, described as follows, to-wit: A main trunk sewer extending at a point in the center of Willow street about midway between Exchange and Cedar streets; thence easterly through private property on Walnut avenue; thence northerly through the land of J. J. Gilbert across Exchange street and through land belonging to A. E. Garret and James McAlister to the center of Buchtel avenue; thence easterly along Buchtel avenue extended westerly to the west end of Buchtel avenue; thence northerly through private property to the center of State street, and also from the west end of Buchtel avenue easterly to the center of Locust street and along Locust street northerly to State street, be proceeded with in accordance with the resolution to construct the same, passed June 12th, 1896, and that said sewer shall be constructed in accordance with the plans, profiles and specifications relating to said improvement on file in the office of the City Civil Engineer, and in accordance with the adopted plans of sewerage of said city. The City Civil Engineer is hereby authorized and required to prepare a plat and file the same in his office showing the bounding and abutting front thereof, and said plat shall be so prepared that an exact location or survey will show what lots or parcels of land bound or abutting said sewer.

Section 2. That the cost and expense of the construction of said sewer and appurtenances, as above contemplated, shall be assessed in the following manner: A special assessment shall be made upon said sewer according to benefits, for an amount sufficient to cover the expense of the construction of a sewer of sufficient capacity to furnish drainage and sewerage for such lots or lands or parcels thereof; said assessment shall be payable in four (4) equal annual installments, and bonds shall be issued in anticipation of the collection of the same. The excess of the cost and expense of constructing said sewer and appurtenances over and above the amount that may be assessed upon the lots and lands and parcels thereof bounding and abutting upon said sewer shall be levied and assessed according to the value upon the tax duplicate of all the real and personal property in said sewer district No. nine (9), and bonds shall be issued in anticipation of the collection of the same, in the manner provided by law.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

An Ordinance

To provide for the sprinkling of North Summit street.

Whereas, the written petition of the owners of more than two-thirds of the feet front on N. Summit street, between Market street and the north line of St. Paul's parsonage, has been presented to the Council asking that said N. Summit street be sprinkled with water, and

Whereas, said N. Summit st. has been improved under the provisions of chapter 4 of the Revised Statutes of Ohio, therefore

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Council of the City of Akron, two-thirds of all the members elected thereto concurring, that from the 1st day of April, 1899, to the 1st day of April, 1900, and from the 1st day of April, 1900, yearly for a period of two years, therefrom said N. Summit street shall be sprinkled with water.

Sec. 2. That in each of said years the cost and expense of said sprinkling shall be levied and assessed equally upon each and every foot front of all the lots and lands and parcels thereof bounding and abutting on both sides of N. Summit street aforesaid.

Sec. 3. That said sprinkling shall be done under the direction of the City Civil Engineer, Jas. H. W. Blake and V. Z. Graham, who are hereby constituted a board in accordance with the provisions of sections 2297 and 2298 of the Revised Statutes of Ohio, as amended, and having the powers therein and hereby granted.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

Railroad Cannot Section Men—All Have Trouble.

The railroad section hand problem seems to be generally before the public at present, for on nearly all the roads the men are demanding more wages.

The men on the Erie road are not conducting a systematic strike, it seems; they have just quit to accept better jobs. The Erie pays better wages to section men than most railroads. The section men get \$1.25 on the Erie, while on some other roads the men get but \$1.15. The Erie is not the only road that is having trouble in getting section help.

Whereas, said West Market street has been improved under the provisions of chapter 4 of the revised statutes of Ohio, therefore

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Council of the City of Akron, Ohio, two-thirds of all the members elected thereto concurring, that from the 1st day of April, 1899, to the 1st day of April, 1900, and from the 1st day of April, 1900, yearly for the period of two years therefrom, said West Market street shall be sprinkled with water.

Sec. 2. That in each of said years the cost and expense of said sprinkling shall be levied and assessed equally upon each and every foot front of all the lots and lands and parcels thereof bounding and abutting on both sides of West Market street aforesaid.

Sec. 3. That said sprinkling shall be done under the directions of the city civil engineer, E. E. Weaver and Andrew Rind, who are hereby constituted a board in accordance with the provisions of sections 2297 and 2298 of the revised statutes of Ohio, as amended, and having the powers therein and hereby granted.

Sec. 4. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.
