nearest telephone station to the cut is at Season's switch. About 1:40 I talked with Martin. He called me up from Season's switch, and said that he was then ready to go after the stone. He said that he would call me up from Northfield for further orders.

"I did not hear from Martin after he talked to me from Season's switch.

"The storm which occurred a little before 3 o'clock in the afternoon of July 7, disarranged our schedule considerably. I think that the telephone line was in such condition that Martin could have telephoned to me from Northfield switch when he was ready to return. A car manned by Conductor A. W. Martin and Motorman Tom Sexton got to Northfield about 2:30. Conductor A. W. Martin telephoned to me from Northfield switch. The telephone service wasn't disarranged at any time. I don't know whether the car loaded with stones was ready to be moved when Earl Martin got to Northfield.

Notified of Wreck.
"About 2:50 Conductor A. W. Spurgeon called me up from Season's switch and notified me of the wreck.

"Car No. 5 could have passed safely with the regular car at Season's switch had they been on time. Schedule time for car 5 to be at Season's switch was 2:40. Conductor Spurgeon on Car 5 had no orders to call me up from any of the telephone stations. When a car arrives at a switch and another car, which should be passed there has not arrived, the conductor is supposed to call me up, in reference to why such car has not arrived."

Mr. Welker was then excused until Friday morning.

Brakeman Testified.
John E. Kelly was called. He lives at Cuyahoga Falls; was a brakeman on the car run by Motorman Earl Martin.

Kelly's orders were received from Martin and were in harmony with those given Martin by Train Dispatcher Welker.

Kelly remembered that car 48 had followed the regular north-bound car to Houser's cut. There a few changes were made preparatory to continuing the trip to Northfield. At Season's switch Earl Martin tried to get the dispatcher's office. Something occurred to deter his action, and he said, "Well, Kelly, we'll go on to Northfield and I'll telephone from there."

"When we got to Northfield we then headed the car north and got the stone car ahead of us. I think there were either six or seven cars loaded with stone standing on the siding. We got one of those cars.

"I did not notice whether Martin telephoned from the Northfield station.

"We left Northfield a very few minutes after we had arrived there. We passed a car at Town line switch. We didn't telephone from Town line switch. We passed a car about a mile south of Town line switch, but it is double-tracked along there. No one along the line told us that we were running ahead of time, or that there was any danger ahead.

"When I first saw car No. 5, north-bound, it was about three-fourths of a mile north of Season's switch.

Waved a Signal.
"We were only a short distance apart, and both cars were running fast. I waved a signal to Martin and closing the brake down I jumped off the car."

Recalled.
Manager was Beilstein recalled and testified that Martin had been discharged once for not picking up the mail and inattention to business.

Dr. Lee Bill of Cuyahoga Falls, was called. He described his being called to the scene of the wreck and his assistance in the treatment of the injured.

Inquest adjourned until Friday morning at 9 o'clock.

Coroner Loberman was assisted at the inquest by Prosecuting Attorney R. M. Wananmaker, W. W. Herick Esq. of Cleveland, attorney for the A. B. & C. line, was present to represent that company. The law firm of Allen & Cobbs of Akron are also counsel for the railway company. Mr. C. S. Cobbs was present at the inquest.

Testimony from Drs. W. C. Jacobs, H. H. Jacobs and T. C. Parks will likely be heard Friday morning.
