UNION CREWS

Refused to Run A., B. & C. Cars Into Cleveland.

The Big Consolidated company is having considerable trouble with the union employes on the suburban lines because of their refusal to bring cars into the city during the strike, says the Cleveland Leader. The Cleveland, Painesville & Eastern and the Akron, Bedford & Cleveland railroads are controlled practically by Henry A. Everett, president of the Big Consolidated.

The union employes on the A., B. & C. line absolutely refused to bring their cars to the public square yesterday, and non-union crews relieved the union men at Newburg. The same state of affairs existed on the Cleveland, Painesville & Eastern line, but an agreement was reached last night whereby the union men promised to run the suburban cars to the Public Square. During the day, before the agreement was reached, there was much trouble on this line.

DROWNED

While In Bathing at Silver Lake.

Was Seized With Cramps—Heroic Attempt at Rescue.

Dachelor was in bathing near the spring board, about five or six feet of water, when he was seized by cramps and drowned before assistance arrived.
