## SPIRIT

Leaves the Body.

Prof. Elias Fraunfelder  
Died Tuesday Evening.

End of Useful and Honor-  
able Career.

Had Been Sufferer For Past  
Five Years.

His Long Service In Interests of  
Education.

Prof. Elias Fraunfelder passed to his reward shortly before 5 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. He was 59 years, four months and five days of age. He retained his faculties to the last, recognizing every one surrounding his bedside. Prof. Fraunfelder has suffered from chronic stomach trouble for five years. Within the last 20 days not a particle of food has passed his lips. The only nourishment he received was by injections. Death was only a matter of time as he was slowly starving. His vitality was remarkable. He was not unconscious at any time.

He was one of the best known, highly respected and most useful citizens of Akron. He will be missed by hundreds of friends. His acquaintance was unusually large.

The funeral services will be conducted at the residence, 580 East Buchtel ave., Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Prof. Fraunfelder named those he desired to act as pall bearers several days ago. They are J. R. Campbell, Captain A. P. Baldwin, H. G. Griffin, Judge N. D. Tibbals, Prof. C. C. Bates and J. H. Seymour. The last five named are past commanders of Buckley post, G. A. R. Captain A.

noted to sergeant, orderly sergeant, first lieutenant and captain for meritorious conduct. He also served as aide-de-camp on the staff of Gen. Peter Osterhaus, ninth division, thirteenth army corps, and later as adjutant for his own regiment. He participated in numerous important battles. He was held captive in a rebel prison for 13 months at Camp Ford, Texas. He was exchanged at New Orleans, May 30, 1865, becoming captain of Co. D, 114th O. V. I. He was mustered out of service with his regiment in Columbus, O., June 27, 1865. A few months later he resumed his position at Vermillion Institute.

He was soon made professor in mathematics and natural science at the Savannah (Ohio) academy, reorganizing the institution and enlarging its buildings.

In September, 1873, he came to Akron, having been chosen professor of engineering and normal studies in Buchtel college. A year later he was made professor in mathematics, where he remained for 10 years. He was elected superintendent of instruction in the Akron Public schools, in August, 1883. He retained this position until June, 1897, serving 14 years.

Prof. Fraunfelder has received a number of degrees from various institutions of learning. He was a prominent member of Buckley Post, G. A. R., and has represented it in a number of National conventions. He was also a member of the Ohio commandery of the Loyal Legion of the United States.

Prof. Fraunfelder was united in marriage April 2, 1867, to Miss Laura K., daughter of Rev. John P. Cald-

So he said to a reporter for the DEMOCRAT Tuesday evening, "I'm glad that we're having such good meetings, and particularly glad that I'm alive to enjoy them."


room of the health department at City hall and three witnesses were examined—Contractor Ira Sprague, J. A. Baldwin, secretary and superintendent of the Buckeye Sewer Pipe company, and Asa Whitestone, a contractor, who has had experience in working clay mines.

No new developments were noted in the testimony of the witnesses. All testified that mining clay was a very dangerous business, requiring especial care.

No more witnesses will be examined and the coroner will file his verdict in a few days.

## Biography.

Prof. Elias Fraunfelder was of German parentage. He was born near Easton, Pa., April 3, 1840. Six years later he came to Ohio with his parents, settling on a farm near Ashland. He was educated in a country school and Vermillion Institute at Haysville. He was chosen tutor of mathematics in this institute when 20 years old.

On August 22, 1862, he enlisted in Company C, 120th O. V. I., was transferred to Company F and then pro-
