PIPE ORGAN

In First M. E. Church Being Repaired.

Twenty Two Hundred Pipes, and Hundreds of Other Pieces.

For the past three weeks A. J. Schantz of Orrville, assisted by his sons, E. F. and O. A., and several other persons, have been engaged in taking apart the mammoth pipe organ in the First M. E. church, subject to a series of repairs which will make it an almost new organ. The organ, which was built by the Johnston Pipe Organ company of Westfield, Mass., has been in the church 30 years, and of late has been in bad repair. The stops could scarcely be operated, and a large amount of strength was required to manipulate the key board. Some of the bellows were broken and the wind chest was cracked. Mr. Schantz will rebuild the organ. The improvements will be completed within the next three weeks. The pitch will be changed from concert to international. New bellows and new pipes will replace old ones, and the general overhauling will be very thorough. At present the floors and all available space in the main auditorium of the church are covered with pieces of the mechanism of the big organ. There are 2,200 pipes, besides hundreds of other pieces. Some of the pipes are made of zinc, while others are made of a combination of tin and lead. The longest pipe is 16 feet in length and the shortest three-fourths of an inch.
