CHILD'S BILL

For His Services
In Connection With Affairs of Palmer.

Attorney Thomas L. Childs was a witness in his own behalf at the trial of the Palmer case Saturday.

His account against Palmer was brought into evidence. It is for professional services extending over a period of 11 months. During that time he charged fees and expenses aggregating \$4,126.56. Palmer is credited with \$105, leaving a balance due of \$4,021.56.

The plaintiff disputes the account as a whole. Some of the items are as follows:
Trip to Florida, \$455; trip to Canada, \$370; trip to Scotland, \$1,204; trip to Canada, \$276; trip to Canada, \$385.

The attorney went over the bill item by item. The cross examination will be taken up Monday. The plaintiff is represented by E. F. Voris and L. S. Pardee and the defendant by L. H. Phelps and W. T. Vaughan.

Contest of Will.
Nancy C. Myers filed a petition in the Common Pleas court Saturday to contest the will of her mother, Elizabeth McKnight. She alleges that John McKnight and the members of his family, while Mrs. McKnight resided at his home, constantly coaxed and flattered the old woman and that she was influenced into making the will as they desired it. She charges McKnight with ill treatment, neglect and the use of insolent and profane language toward his mother.

Other Pleadings.
Ida Bittman has filed an answer and cross petition in the case of the Permanent Building & Loan association vs. C. A. Boder. She holds a mortgage for \$3,500 on the property of the defendant.

The damage case of Harmon D. Eberhard vs. Diamond Match Co. has been transferred to United States Circuit court.

The First National bank, in an answer and cross petition sets up a mortgage for \$4,574.94 in the case of Lizzie M. Steiner vs. Raymond C. Penfield.

Mrs. Bessie K. Raymond has sued the Mutual Life Insurance Co. of New York for \$2,500, alleged to be due on a policy on the life of her husband, John G. Raymond.

Minor Matters.
Max Hollob, charged with grand larceny, was arraigned in Common Pleas court Saturday. He pleaded not guilty.

The will of Daniel Wise was probated Friday, despite the objections of the heirs who protested against the appointment of Henry Wise as executor.

been received. The third floor on the Howard st. side will be occupied by the exchange of the Akron People's Telephone company. It is proposed to have this in operation by February 1, 1900.

The architects who prepared the plans for the new building are Meade & Garfield of Cleveland. Charles Wright, a son of R. H. Wright of this city, is acting as inspector. The general contractors are Geo. W. Carmichael & Co. The fire proofing was awarded to the E. V. Johnson company of Chicago. Terra cotta work to the Northwestern Terra Cotta of Chicago; plumbing to Kraus, Kirn & Co. of Akron, and structural steel and iron work to the Akron Foundry company.

Amendments Discussed
by Lay Delegates

At Conference of East Ohio Methodists—Returned to Home.

The Akron lay delegates who attended the East Ohio Methodist Episcopal conference at Alliance came home Friday evening. They were led by J. H. Seiler, First church; Charles L. Brown and Joseph Thomas, Grace church; J. B. Sargent, South Main Street church, and S. Kile, Woodland church. Conference will not close until Monday or Tuesday.

The Lay-conference session, which lasts but one day, was held Friday in the Wesleyan church, while the regular sessions of the conference are held in the magnificent new First M. E. church.

The principal business before the Lay-conference was the election of lay delegates to attend the general conference at Chicago, next May.

For this there was a very lively but friendly race between the friends of the various candidates.

The result of the election was: Hon. Silas J. Williams, Alliance, and Frank A. Arter, Cleveland, for regular delegates, and Joseph Chapman, Painesville, and C. Alderman, McCollsville, for reserves.

Provincial delegates are Judge J. Mansfield, Steubenville; R. J. Boy, Canton; John G. Fisher, Youngstown, and J. S. White, Barnesville.

Resolves for provisionals are J. A. Richards, New Philadelphia, and J. W. Excell, Cleveland.

The resolution to amend section 32, general rules of discipline, which pertains to buying, selling and using spirituous liquors, so as to include the sale and use of tobacco, was vigorously discussed and finally laid on the table.

The resolution to do away with the transfer of ministers from one conference to another, was the occasion for a very spirited discussion, and was likewise tabled.

Memorial, petitioning general conference to admit equal lay representation carried unanimously.

Resolution petitioning general conference to so amend section 100 of discipline, taking the appointive power out of hands of quarterly conference, and make it congregational, was likewise tabled.

This was the principal business transacted by the Lay conference, after which all went to First church to unite in joint conference, and hear address from Bishop Malliean.


ESCAPED
