TO AKRON Will a Manufacturing Plant be Brought.

Enterprise Manufacturing Company Buys New Haven Plant.

Mr. Joseph E. Pfueger, of the Enterprise Manufacturing Company, will leave this evening for New Haven, Conn., to superintend the moving of the company's automatically-equipped plant for the manufacturing of fish hooks and tackle to this city.

It is expected that the plant equipment will be moved to Akron by the last of next week and be in operation within three weeks. The addition will give employment to over 40 new men at the Enterprise Manufacturing company's plant.
