The funeral of Mrs. Veronica Halter was held Saturday at St. Bernard's church. A large crowd of sorrowing friends attended. Rev. J. B. Brown conducted the services. Interment in St. Bernard's cemetery.

The canvassing committee soliciting funds for Buchtel College, is meeting with success. It is understood that the committee have pledged two \$5,000 subscriptions but the names of the donors are withheld. President Priest has received a \$250 check from a Massachusetts "friend."

The police department on Saturday afternoon indulged the newspaper men with a ride in the new automobile patrol. The trip was from the City building south on Main St., to the street car barn and return.

Forty hours' devotion services began at St. Mary's church Sunday at 10 a. m., and will conclude at 7 p. m. Tuesday. Attendance upon the services is good.

Plans for the expenditure of \$25,000, 000 on improvements have been completed by the Baltimore & Ohio. A great per cent. of this is to be used between Pittsburg and Chicago.

The formal consolidation of the C. & H., and the C. & M. V. lines connecting Dayton and Cincinnati will take place this week. The Christy Bros., of Akron, are large stockholders.

## BOY KILLED.

### Accidentally Shot Himself Saturday.

### Unfortunate Lad Was Bradie Switzer, Aged 14 Years.

Saturday afternoon, while hunting with a companion, 14-year-old Bradie Switzer, whose parents live near Thomastown, accidentally shot and killed himself. He was carrying a rifle and his hands becoming cold he placed them in his pockets and leaned the barrel of the gun against his chest. In some manner the hammer was raised and snapped suddenly. No Match For French.  
Algiers, Jan. 15.—(Spl.)—The natives of Insalah, who were defeated by the force of Col. Flanaut, of the French exploring expedition, on Dec. 28, again attacked the French on Jan. 5. There were 1,300 natives against 192 Frenchmen; 150 natives were killed and 200 wounded, whereupon the Insalans surrendered.

## QUEER DEFENSE

### For Polygamist Roberts Made by a College Professor.

Binghamton, N. Y., Jan. 15.—(Spl.)—Prof. E. C. Kenney, who was connected with Cornell University and later with Johns Hopkins University, at Baltimore, has championed the cause of Congressman Roberts of Utah. He says:

"It seems remarkable that in a land where old maids are forever complaining because men will not marry them, when one is elected to congress who has been large hearted enough to take three or four wives he should have such trouble in taking his seat."

Prof. Kenney argues that the supply of unmarried women in this country will soon exceed the male population and that Roberts is only following the lead of the scriptural characters in the course he has taken. He says that a man who is willing to even up the present unnatural state of affairs and take more than one wife deserves to be cheered, and asks why under these circumstances a man should be persecuted.
